Known Knowns And Unknown Unknowns

It's almost Rumsfeld territory.

The Government, battered after its annus horribilis, is trying to pick itself up and undo the damage in the year and a bit before the election. Few give it much chance. It is eight months since Labour showed in double figures, almost a year since Fine Gael got 30%.

However, the earliest opinion poll of 2015 offered some solace with slight increases in support for both Coalition partners to 24% and 8% respectively. While any recovery has a long way to go, some Fine Gael supporters are grasping at the straw that only six months before the last election their support was similarly languishing but recovered strongly. True; but then they were in opposition, not in government with a record to defend. This applies also – in spades – to Labour, who are under sustained attack from the Left over broken election promises.

Pundits argue that the unpopularity revealed in the polls has been too long in the making and cannot be reversed in the short time available, citing the difficulty of regaining the electorate's trust once lost. Some see a post-election scenario in which three parties (FG, FF, and SF) would each have broadly similar levels of support, in the mid-twenties, with a further twentyodd percent going to a Macedonia of independents, new parties and those of the hard left, the balance going to a Labour party rump.

Whether this or some other new political landscape will emerge remains to be seen. A year is a very long time in politics and there are different factors at play. Strategists of both government parties are fairly clear on what must be done – or avoided – to give them a reasonable chance. First there must be an act of faith – that the pendulum will swing back, not fully but just enough. Voter disenchantment can be volatile as well as enduring, particularly if there is no readily available viable alternative on offer. This probably saved the skin of several past Fianna Fail administrations. Still to be resolved is whether and to what

extent the two parties will present jointly.



Second, avoid Banana Skins or, if slipping, minimise the damage asap. The handwringing over Irish Water,

the bleating defence of the indefensible over medical cards, cost the Government dearly last year. Cop outs like trying to blame a quango, or an unelected Regulator, or whinging that legislation ties the Minister's hands, simply will not work where the public is seized of an issue. A government is elected to govern, not deliver excuses. Tough decisions may on occasion be necessary and the electorate tends to understand; wrong decisions, or no decisions, they will not.

Third, take on the opposition on the economy. The budget deficit remains huge, even factoring out interest payments on Ireland's bailout. Borrowing continues. We are still living way beyond our means to sustain current levels of welfare and to run the state. The opposition have been coy on alternatives, beyond soaking the rich. They should be pushed on specifics.

It is not enough to point proudly to seeing off the Troika. An achievement, certainly, but one that has already been oversold. There is speculation that a new Greek government may, as threatened, reject or seek to renegotiate with the rest of Europe the terms of Greece's economic bailout. Merely an election promise or a nuclear option? Should the Greeks secure a favourable deal by acting tough, the Government's Troika boast would be rubbished. While Fianna Fail can be largely discounted on this, since it negotiated the Irish bailout terms, the potential boost to Sinn Fein, the hard left and independents could be considerable at the worst possible time.

Fourth, above all: Be Alert! Known knowns like Irish Water and medical cards have been identified – painfully and attempts to cope with them put in train. This appears to have worked for the medical card issue. However the anti – water campaign is still very much alive and two significant dates are looming. The first is the early February deadline for registration, which will demonstrate whether the disaffected middle is satisfied with the government's compromise climbdown. The second is Easter, when the first water bills issue (and shortly after the property tax has been extracted).

The government has been playing up the tax cuts from 1 January, pointing to taxpayers having more money in their



pockets. These savings, however, look set to be cancelled out by the water bills, while the estimated 40% who pay no tax will feel the charges even more. The hyped €100 for registering with Irish Water won't arrive until much later in the year. Watch this space!

There is also what could be waiting in the long grass. After years of cutting and trimming there are several potentials and it behoves the strategists to keep an ear very close to the ground – or at least to the daily radio talk shows. The plight of the homeless flared up before Christmas and there is currently the annual waitingon-trolley scandal in hospital emergency departments, which seems worse this year. There could be legacy issues regarding past scandals - though these could affect all parties - and it will be interesting to see how the government handles the imminent report on the direct provision regime for asylum seekers. One other unknown is the extent of the rising tide of house repossessions and what effect these will have politically. On this issue the can-kicking appears to have reached a cul de sac. None of these are critical as yet.

There ARE positive factors. One which the pundits, the population and the

politicians seem to have woken up

simultaneously to is the spin off from the

dramatic fall in oil prices. Lower prices for

petrol and home heating have provided a welcome cash boost - rivalling that of the budget and with a multiplier effect. How this will play out in terms of a general feel good factor is a big unknown. Some of the benefits could be offset by the downward drift in the exchange rate of the Euro. There could also well be public ire should the lower fuel prices not be reflected in terms of cuts in electricity and gas prices. Irish consumers pay dearly for electricity in particular and a forensic examination of the feather-bedded companies is long overdue. This one is a slow burner (ouch!).

With the most recent economic trends there is some leeway to placate public opinion, by rowing back or reversing some of the austerity measures over the next year. A start has already been signalled with for example overtures on pay to the public sector. There will definitely be at least one giveaway budget and a good chance of a second. The Spring Economic Statement may prove to be more than just words if the polls remain unfavourable.

Nothing will prevent massive seat losses for the Government parties in the next Dail. Yet the strongest card it has may well prove to be the electorate's reluctance to endorse Sinn Fein or to court the possibility of a government in thrall to a disparate group of independents. Now that WOULD be an Unknown Unknown! Oh, there is mighty stuff aplenty this time! Very diverse lot for you. First, a wonderful new singer to us.

Speaking of talented gals come from away, here is Anna Falkenau with Feileacan na Saoirse (The Butterfly of Freedom). She is a wonderful fiddle and viola player. Very traditional in approach, with a real modern day feel to her stylings and own compositions. She is one of thousands over the years who have come to Irish music from outside Ireland, become conversant in it and really become a part of it. She is part of the German contingent that has made Ireland home in reality and musically. Ged Foley is a

great addition to the album on guitar, and along with others--Ringo McDonagh on bodhran--really nails it. A bright new musician on the international scene with a terrific new album!

JigJam has an album, Oh Boy!, out. At first, we simply thought this new group was We Banjo 3 from Tullamore, as groups try to pile on the express train created by the Galway group. Well, it is and it isn't. First, let there be no doubt. These three are talented. VERY. They do the full mix of Irish and Americana—very popular lately. To this they add a terrific touch of bluegrass! Blessed bluegrass! They are the only Irish group we know that is really employing Scruggs-style banjo in their work. They are very, very good vocally, and the best Irish group so far in bluegrass. Along with Socks in the Frying

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Pan and We Banjo, this group earns a place in your collection. They are really young, and really good. We like this more and

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

It kind of hit me somewhere along the line that this is what I want to do," Megan told me. "I recently reentered school for a Physician's Assistant program. It dawned on me one day that this is what I want out of life. I want to help people. It was truly all because of Maureen. Kind of life her parting gift to me; 'by the way, girl, here's what you should do with your life. Now go do it.'"

Sometimes life throws us into unexpected circumstances. How we react makes all the difference. It can be life altering, if we're willing to listen. Maureen helped so many people get back on their life's path or find it in the first place. So many unsure pregnant women at The Women's Center

on Chicago's north side where Our path in life can be difficult she volunteered countless hours sorting clothing, supervising



"On the Floor" is the newest from Wendy (www.wendymacissac. com) and I dare you to keep your feet still when you listen to it. I love Nova Scotia fiddling and Wendy is the finest Nova Scotia fiddler that it's ever been my privilege to watch and listen to. I know I'm biting off a lot saying that in that Nova Scotia is a hotbed of great fiddlers but I stand by my judgment that Wendy is best. There's something about Nova Scotia that brings out the best in fiddlers for dancing and that's what this CD is. Recorded live at a dance with Tracey Dares MacNeil on piano (always wonderful to listen to!) and Patrick Gillis on guitar you can sometimes hear the dancers pounding out a beat with their feet in the background. Wendy states that the pounding feet on the floor can give your playing an extra lift and you can sure hear it here as she works that fiddle putting out the liveliest of tunes for the dancers. Kelly's enormous erudition is used throughout to make those characters come to life. But she uses it so gently and naturally, that I was unaware of it.



All That is Solid Melts into Air

Darragh McKeon's novel All That is Solid Melts into Air is a raw look into mid-1980s Soviet Union and the nuclear meltdown that impacted the lives of millions and numerous future generations. When an explosion at the Chernobyl power plant causes massive amounts of radiation to pour into the air, families are evacuated from their homes to escape the poison that's rapidly spreading. As whole forests begin to die and animals bleed from their ears, a population that knows close to nothing about this invisible

assailant is left to fix itself.

Although described as "an endof-empire novel", the beauty in All That is Solid does not come from a wide view of the politics and details of the key players involved but instead from the smaller, everyday characters. McKeon's story weaves together the lives of those impacted such as the young children evacuating with their family and the infected victims whom even nurses do not touch.

Grigory Blovkin, a surgeon called in to help clean up the mess, at first believes that those in charge will finally be forced to answer for their mistakes and a

methodical, organized cleanup can start. However as evacuation plans for surrounding cities are ignored and safety procedures abandoned, he becomes tormented struggling to work under a government more concerned about its international appearance than its own people.

"...no one sees to anything, Grigory. We'll have to clean this up with our own bare hands."

Unable to do much more, he buries himself in his job at the hospital. He witnesses first

hand the damage and the sickness left behind: infants

breaking down and turning to mush, cancer and tumors forming in children and adults.

Meanwhile back home in Moscow, people continue on with their lives, the danger that surrounds them nothing more than gossip. Here, the novel's

focus shifts away from the power plant to those lives who are seemingly untouched by the explosion. Families struggle to feed themselves, and laborers suffer through abhorrent working conditions for fear of losing their job or worse. Yevgeni, a child piano

born only partially developed, prodigy, is more concerned by the organs of exposed workers bullying that plagues him than

the nuclear disaster not too far away. His aunt Maria, a factory worker living in fear of her past, struggles to decide if taking part in a workers' strike will better their lives or merely place those she cares about in danger. All the while rumors circulate of mutated animals, children losing hair, and a cover-up by the government to

ensure that everything is fine. All That is Solid is a powerful story about the Soviet Union just before its end. It's a shocking look into those impacted by the tragedy of Chernobyl and those consequences that still exist today. The book explores the hope of a future out of the sins of the past, and the mistakes for which future generations will have to pay. McKeon is the kind of writer who gives his story the quiet yet powerful voice that will echo for years to come.

My Dear Old (Book) Galway Bay



Reared in County Down in Ireland's North, Charles wanted to work in the music industry. So as a teenager he moved to London, the center of the music industry. He became a music agent and made a life there. He lives in London with his wife Catherine.

*Paul you were raised in County Down. How did that influence your wonderful ability to write vivid scenes? "There was no TV when I was young. People talked

with each other and entertained themselves. They told colorful stories about local people and events."

*How did you learn how policemen think? "I go into the shoes of my detectives. My detective fiction is influenced by Agatha Christie, Arthur Conan Doyle and Colin Dexter."

* Policemen are intensely observant. Your descriptions of people they encounter are very detailed. "Policemen can learn a lot about a person even before a word is said."

In the Interest of Co-Existence... Stop Murdering People!

Writing this, I – like many others in the civilized world – am still trying to take in the events of the past several days in France. It has been an extraordinary week, one in which the very principles of free speech were attacked in the most murderous manner imaginable.

We've already let this lout use our own media to threaten us with our own laws. Let me tell you: we lie down to guys like this and we will never ever be given the opportunity to get back on our feet again. Never. These guys are in this for the longhaul and we would seriously want to cop on to ourselves.



In Praise of Peter Taylor

Last year, the veteran BBC tele-tagonists—Republicans, Loyalists vision journalist, Peter Taylor, returned to Northern Ireland, where he has made dozens of documentaries about the Troubles. His objective was to film a documentary about the North of Ireland in a more personal style this time, as seen through four decades of his film-making experience.

An Englishman by birth, Taylor became enthralled, in the late 1960s at the outset of his career, by the Northern Troubles in all its pity and terror, and stayed with events in the North from that point through to the Peace Process. Others of his ilk tended to gain the limelight in the North and travel back to England for a more sedate life once they had made their names. Instead, Taylor stayed the course and cut a compassionate figure, forming extraordinarily close relationships both with senior figures in Northern politics and in the armed struggle, and with civilian victims of violence. He regularly met those people, listened to them and responsibly gave them their voices through his documentaries; the body of work he recorded constitutes an important source for an understanding

of recent Northern Irish history. As leading member of the BBC's Panorama team, Taylor had enormous influence in conveying a fresh message about the Northern crisis. Panorama's impact reverberates across the UK, Ireland and beyond: its viewership numbers more people than the readership of all of English broadsheet newspapers combined. Thus Taylor came to be widely perceived, in England especially, as a reliable interpreter of the North of Ireland. His particular strength is in illustrating the complexities of the situation and steeling his audience against easy one-sided formulations about the cause of and solution to the Troubles, keeping each of the proand the British—in focus.

The personal documentary he made last year, filming for four months in Belfast, is entitled Who Won the War? It is clear from the beginning that the title itself poses an unsatisfactory question since, with over three thousand people dead, countless more maimed and psychologically scarred on all sides, what could possibly constitute a victory?

From a loyalist perspective, with the structures now in place for a Northern majority to vote to secede from the U.K., there is the loss of their union guarantee: the status quo upon which unionist politics traditionally fixed its focus to avoid any constitutional reform

The Republican side is more nuanced in its response to the question of victory. Those who joined the IRA claimed a mandate to fight for a United Ireland and settled for an agreement that comes far short. To use a phrase immortalised by Michael Collins, the current accommodation could be a "stepping stone" towards that goal. Yet it should never be forgotten that such a deal was on the table, and signed by British and Irish governments, in 1973. The power-sharing Northern government established then was sabotaged by, among others, people who today hold high office in Ireland North and South. The vigour with which those who now have absorbed the concepts of gradualism and accommodation, as they revise their original ambitions and deny self-evident facts about their own involvement in "the struggle" down the years, is remarkable.

Another Republican perspective is bitter: we lost the war, our side betrayed the cause by agreeing to a power-sharing arrangement in the state they vowed to dismantle. Or, to adopt a slogan painted on the

gable ends in Derry's Bogside area: 'Sinn Féin Touts.'

Because Taylor has filmed in the North over such a lengthy period, he can use, and did use adeptly in this documentary, his old footage as a story-telling device. After showing testimonies to former terrorists turned politicians, or simply older heads looking back at their inglorious youth, Taylor seeks the views of his interviewees on how they conducted their lives. It is compelling to listen to some participants express contrition on the one hand, and predictable yet disappointing to observe politicians avoid facing the full consequences of their past actions.

One of the sorrows of a depiction of Northern Ireland in recent decades is how little there is to admire in the political protagonists who now hold office. If Progressive Unionist Party leader David Ervine had lived and had the chance to participate in a power-sharing arrangement, say for ten years, it seems likely that his leadership would have given Northern Ireland's unionist community the stability it required. Shortly before his death, Ervine stated that what he and his PUP colleagues strove to do, which was made difficult by the continuation of the Ulster Volunteer Force's massacres, was "an exploration of the future." His thinking was a necessary and highly desirable manifestation of a new form of unionism capable

of balancing the North politically. Standing at the hustings during his 1983 electoral success in West Belfast, Gerry Adams proudly announced: "Tiocfaidh ár Lá" (Our day will come), a slogan as closely associated with the IRA and its United Ireland objectives as "In God We Trust" is with the US dollar bill. Yet Adams, again in this documentary, denies ever being a member of the IRA. Martin Mc-Guinness, who admits that he was an IRA volunteer until 1974, can be seen in archival footage chanting "the IRA" in Derry's Guildhall after votes were counted in an election in the 1980s. Electorally, even in the warped environment of Northern Ireland, that position was difficult to sustain. That is why John Hume outpolled McGuinness

his historic electoral success in 1983, Adams failed to consistently hold his seat in West Belfast.

During one of Taylor's earliest visits to Derry, John Hume pointed out Martin McGuinness to him, saying that that was a man to watch. All these years later, Peter Taylor surmises that, with McGuinness having embrace parliamentarianism, the shift towards a new politics is so profound that there may indeed be, in some distant future, a United Ireland.

again and again in Derry and, after If that means winning the war and if that was, in the estimation of some people, worth the lives lost, then it nevertheless must be conceded that constitutional politics ultimately succeeded where violence failed.

For a survey of the past two generations in the North of Ireland, Peter Taylor's book and film trilogy-Republicans, Loyalists and Brits—all three essential panels in the triptych, is an excellent place to start. Though it is a galling picture to behold.

A Brief Timeline Of The Book Of Kells

Compiled by Frank Crowley

The Book of Kells is one of a group of Gospel manuscripts scholars call INSULAR STYLE, produced from the late 6th century through early 9th century, in Irish, Scottish, Northern English and Continental monasteries with Irish or English origins. In addition, they contain similarities in artistic style, calligraphic and textual traditions and were mutually influential.

The Book was written using the Vulgate translation of Jerome from c. 384 C.E., in a calligraphic style commonly described as "Insular Majuscule."

The typical organization of Insular Gospel books contains what are called Preliminaries. These preliminaries consist of: 1. Hebrew Names: A list of names found



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
in the Gospels. Jerome studied the origin of Hebrew names as written in Greek and translated them into a newer version of Latin which became known as "Vulgate."

- 2. Canon Tables: A concordance of Gospel passages common to two or more of the evangelists. Compiled by Eusebius of Caeserea in the 4th Century.
- 3. Virgin and Child with Angels: [Found only in the Book of Kells] It is the oldest existing portrait of the Virgin and Child. 4. Breves Causae: Summaries of each of
- the Gospels. Argumenta: Characterizations of each of the evangelists. 6. Symbols of the four evangelists: A full
- page: Man: Matthew; Lion: Mark; Calf: Luke; Eagle: John.
- 7. Portrait: A full-page image of each evangelist introducing his gospel.

8. First word or phrase: A full illuminated page at the beginning of each Gospel using the first word or phrase. Of 680 existing folios, 33 are full-page illuminations and only two have no decoration at all. A few leaves are not completed and some of the scribes' techniques can be seen.

Legends record that around 561 C.A., Columba (Latin for Colum Kille D. 597) led a group of monks to the Island of Iona off the cost of Scotland to establish a monastery and scriptorium. After a long period of peaceful life, Viking raids in c. 795 and c. 802 made life for the monks dangerous. In 807, many of

the monks left for Kells, the site of an ancient hill fort in Co. Meath, Ireland, and again built a new monastery and scriptorium.

The Annals of Ulster, one of several chronicles of medieval Ireland, recorded that in the year 878 more monks arrived from Iona with valuables and relics. The description in the Annals suggests that the Book was among their valuables.

MEDIEVAL ERA

Reliable documents record:

9th century: Book of Kells at Kells Abby. 1006 (1007, modern calendar): Viking raid. Book stolen and recovered. An entry in Annals of Ulster reported "Great Gospel of Colum Kille (not yet called "Book of Kells"), chief relic of the Western world, was wickedly stolen during the night from the Western sacristy of the great stone church at Cenannas (Kells) on account of its wrought Shrine." Most of the bound folios were discovered ... "two months and twenty days"... later... "under a sod." Scholars surmise the pages were ripped from its covers and discarded because they were not considered valuable. Sacred book covers and their containers, called "shrines" were often decorated with precious metals and jewels. This could explain the estimated 10 bifolios (double pages) from the beginning and 12 bifolios from the end of the Book that are lost.

11th and 12th century: Land charters regarding the Abbey of Kells were copied on blank pages of the Book: 6 v (left side) Art Facsimile Publishers of Switzerland. and 7r and 27r (right side).

MODERN ERA

15th Century: A poem complaining about taxation on church land was written on 289v, a blank leaf.

16th Century: A Gerald Plunkett of Dublin added the chapter numbers in the folio margins that were originated in the 13th Century by Stephen Langton, Archbishop of Canterbury.

1621: Each folio was numbered by Bishop-elect

of Meath, James Ussher.

1653: Oliver Cromwell's army was quartered in what was the badly damaged

Governor of Kells, Charles Lambart, Earl of Cavan, sent the Book to Dublin for safe keeping around 1657.

1661: Book "presented" to Trinity College Dublin by Henry Jones, later, Bishop of Meath and former scoutmaster general to Cromwell's army in Ireland.

1741: A folio discovered to be folded the wrong way was corrected and reinserted.

1821: Manuscript was cropped from 14 1/2" x 10 1/4" to 13" x 9 1/2", damaging some of the images, then rebound and edges were gilded. All pages are not exactly the same size and the original size is not certain.

1821: Victoria and Albert visited Dublin and signed a blank page.

J. H. Todd, Trinity Collage Librarian (1852-69) numbered the leaves in lower left corner. 1895: Rebound-didn't last.

1920's: Several folios kept loose.

1951: Publishers Urs Graf-verlag, Bern, Switzerland made black and white facsimile plus 48 pages in Color.

1953: Bound into 4 volumes by Roger

Signed page of Victoria and Albert was removed.

1974: Book of Kells Study by Francoise Henry published.

1990: Color facsimile published by Fine

2000: St. Mark gospel sent to Australia. Some pigment damaged.

2012: City of Kells petition Trinity College for their book to be returned.

Present: Gospels rebound into four volume, two open volumes on view at a

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Working with Families and Business Owners

THE 6-COUNTY IRISH, under British rule for centuries began, in 1968, to demand basic democracy; one-man-one-vote. Campaigners were clubbed and arrested by gangs of Orangemen and the RUC; but the Irish persisted and, in 1973, won the vote.

BRITS REACTED; employers were required to deny jobs to Catholics (indigenous Irish), forcing them into exile and thus off the voter rolls. At that time eleven percent of Occupied Ireland's workers were employed by twenty-five U.S. companies, so Irish-America decided to oppose Britain's job-denial policy. The MacBride Principles for Fair Employment in Northern Ireland (modeled on the Sullivan Principles for South Africa) were created. They required US companies in Occupied Ireland to maintain American hiring standards. Irish-Americans across the nation worked for enactment, enabling managers to respond; "Sorry; but U.S. law requires me to maintain fair hiring standards."

IRISH-ILLINOIS ACTS. After abandoning tactics such as leafleting after Sunday Masses, and ordinary petitions, we contacted State Rep John McNamara (R.I.P.). Under his competent direction we wrote MacBride support letters and mailed Illinois pols some 50,000 to 60,000 of them signed by constituents. It took nearly two years but with the generous help of Radio Show Host Mike O'Connor, Cathy Roach McDonnell, Lobbyist Tom Duffy, scores of volunteers, day-trippers to Springfield, and the letters editors of the ChiTrib and Sun-Times, Irish-Illinois won passage of the MacBride Principles by 84-14 in the House and 53-2 in the Senate. That landslide doesn't convey reality; many "testified" against, and saboteurs for Britain did their damnedest.

CITY OF CHICAGO. Chicago's \$multibillion annual purchasing budget caused us to pursue an ordinance mandating that City suppliers and contractors require their branches in Occupied Ireland to adopt MacBride. Schenectady, NY had just passed a strong MacBride ordinance, so I tailored it for the Chicago City Council and asked Alderman Eddie Burke to spearhead it. Within days Mayor Daley asked to lead it. Later, his office informed me that Alderman Pat O'Connor was running against Jack O'Malley and needed an edge among Irish-Illinoisans, so I agreed that O'Connor would spearhead MacBride. We didn't know it immediately, but O'Connor betrayed Chicago, especially Irish-Chicago, by footdragging and creating obstructions. Despite MacBride's landslide passage in Springfield O'Connor questioned its popularity and

gave us a telephone No. on which to record support. After thousands had left their support messages, he refused to show the results; telling us to find out via the Freedom of Information Act. He sent me miss-dated letters and scheduled a MacBride vote to preclude its supporters. When O'Connor informed me that he was replacing me with a group of lawyers (led by FBI mole Jerome Boyle, our constant saboteur) to conduct suburban hearings on MacBride, I dismissed O'Connor by letter, resumed seeking an honest Irish-American alderman and soon found one; Thomas Murphy. Murphy promptly introduced MacBride; it passed unanimously. Though O'Connor had betrayed Chicago for a foreign kingdom, under public scrutiny he voted "Yes."

MORE O'CONNOR. Schoolteacher Dianne Daleiden is running for 40th Ward Alderman - O'Connor's fiefdom. "Publius" writes: I don't know politics, just know Dianne's opponent (O'Connor) worked for K.C. Bae who was convicted of bribing FDA officials & subsequently barred for life from the U.S. pharmaceutical industry. Sentence served, Bae started Foster Bank, and remained a major shareholder until its 2013 acquisition by BBCN Bank. O'Connor was Foster Bank's in-house legal counsel when its Directors violated the Bank Secrecy Act and two were removed by FDIC consent order. He (O'Connor) has taken campaign donations from a dead-beat dad (Cedomir Zuric) who fled country in 2009 to avoid arrest, owing \$500,000 for back child support. He (O'Connor) had no problem voting to approve Zuric's condo developments despite Zuric's status as a dead-beat, an alien, subject to deportation. How can a felon with unpaid child support get a General Contractor's license and Zoning Approvals in Chicago? O'Connor bought an investment condo in a building for which his realtor-wife had an exclusive listing arrangement. The dead-beat developer and his brother also acted as his condo association's board of directors while donating to him. The felon-developer had a fiduciary role with the Alderman to collect his monthly maintenance assessments while donating money to Citizens for Patrick J. O'Connor. Did O'Connor disclose as required? Nope. In 2008, a puff-piece about O'Connor diverted attention from his huge TIF condo project

up the street with felon-developer Jacob



Kiferbaum who, along with Levine, was extorting Edwards Hospital. Media Icon Carol Marin famously did an NBC 5 segment in March 2009 when O'Connor ran for

Congress. She dramatically knocked on door of Cedomir Zuric who had already fled the country. Marin, by googling "Cedomir Zuric" would have learned of his outstanding Cook County arrest warrant. In March 2013, Zuric was perp-walked on NBC 5 - finally arrested after being 5-year fugitive. Ironically, Marin doesn't respond and Zuric still owes \$500,000 back child support.

Publius' civic courage is precious because

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it is so rare. The corruption of the news media has transferred the entire burden of upholding American democracy onto such brave souls. It is they who are our national heroes; the bravest few.

DIANNE DALEIDEN courageously demands an investigation of the Edgewater Medical Center real estate deal O'Connor pushed through with CA Development, for whom his wife is a broker. Ten years ago Daleiden fought O'Connor's O'Hare Modernization Plan which directs 70% of all incoming O'Hare flights over the 40th ward harming its house values and quality of life.

We must cherish patriots like teacher Dianne Daleiden who have the courage to run against corrupt power.



Well, come on now: it's not as if they haven't made their long-term intentions crystal clear to us, is it?

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


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A Chairde:







2015 Irish American Hall of Fame Inductees

Bob Newhart, Gene Kelly, John Hus- awards, including an honorton, Ann McGlone Burke, and Mother Frances Xavier Warde Among Class of 2015 Inductees for the Irish American Hall of Fame

Now celebrating its fifth year, the Irish American Hall of Fame (IAHOF) is proud to announce its 2015 class of inductees. Over 400 nominations were submitted from July through September 2014 from individuals all over the world. A specially selected screening group reviewed and culled the nominations into a representative list of candidates. In December 2014, a national body of distinguished individuals representing academia, government, and Irish-affiliated organizations from around the United States selected the winners.

Introducing the 2015 Irish American Hall of Fame inductees:

Arts and Humanities:

John Huston was an American film director, screenwriter and actor. He wrote most of the 37 feature films he directed, many of which are today considered classics: The Maltese Falcon (1941), The Treasure of the Sierra Madre (1948), Key Largo (1948), The Asphalt Jungle (1950), The African Queen (1951), Moulin Rouge (1952), The Misfits (1961), and The Man Who Would Be King (1975). During his 46-year career, Huston received 15 Oscar nominations, winning twice, and directed both his father, Walter Huston, and daughter, Angelica Huston, to Oscar win in different films. Huston died in 1987 at the age of 81.

Eugene "Gene" Curran Kelly was an American dancer, actor, singer, film director, producer and choreographer. He is best known for his performances in Anchors Aweigh (1945), On the Town (1949), An American in Paris (1951) and Singin' in the Rain (1952). As a former gymnast, he brought an athletic new dimension to dance that was appreciated by theatre and Hollywood audiences from the 1930s ary Academy Award for career achievement in 1952, and lifetime achievement awards from the Kennedy Center Honors in 1982, the American Film Institute in 1985 and the Screen Actors Guild in 1989. Kelly died in 1996 at the age of 83. George Robert "Bob" Newhart

is an American stand-up comedian and actor. His breakthrough 1960 live album, The Button-Down Mind of Bob Newhart, won Album of the Year at the 1961 Grammy awards, and launched him into stardom. Newhart later took up acting, starring in two long-running, award-winning television series, first as psychologist Dr. Robert "Bob" Hartley on the 1970s sitcom The Bob Newhart Show and then as innkeeper Dick Loudon on the 1980s sitcom Newhart. A native of Oak Park, IL, he attended Catholic elementary and high school, and graduated from Loyola University of Chicago in 1952 with a bachelor's degree in business management. He continues to do live comedy shows and to act on television, most recently appearing in recurring roles on Desperate Housewives and The Big Bang Theory.

Business & Industry:

Sister Sheila Lyne is the retired CEO of Mercy Hospital & Medical Center. She was born and raised on Chicago's South Side, and joined the community of the Sisters of Mercy in 1953. 

In 2007, The Holy See appointed Father Wall as President of the Catholic Church Extension Society which strengthens the Church's presence and mission in underresourced and isolated communities across the United States.

Mother Frances Xavier Warde was one of the seven original sisters who founded the Sisters of Mercy in the United States in 1843. In 1846, she accompanied a group of five sisters to Chicago to institute the first parochial schools in Illinois. By 1852, the sisters had built Mercy Hospital and Orphan Asylum, the city's first permanent general hospital. At the time of her death in 1884, Frances Xavier Warde had established over 82 Mercy convents, schools, hospitals, orphanages, and other works of mercy in 20 cities across nine states.

Francis S. Collins is an American geneticist who led the Human Genome Project which succeeded in decoding the human genome. He is currently director of the National Institutes of Health. Born in Staunton, VA, Collins earned a

Irish American Hall of Fame to Honor Billy Lawless as 2015 Hometown Hero April 25

The Irish American Hall of Fame (IA-HOF) is proud to announce that Billy Lawless will be recognized as the 2015 Hometown Hero. The Irish American Hall of Fame Hometown Hero Award recognizes individuals who have distinguished themselves as leaders within their local Irish community and have a consistent track record of contributions and service over many years that helped to preserve or strengthen Irish heritage at a local level. Lawless has earned the distinction of "Hometown Hero" for his contributions to the local Chicago economy and business community, for his tireless advocacy for U.S. immigration reform, and for promoting Irish culture in Chicagoland.

Born and raised in Galway, Ireland, Lawless was brought up in a family long immersed in the hospitality industry. He was a dairy farmer before he moved to Chicago with his family in and helped open the Wrigleyville's first Irish bar, The Irish Oak. This was followed by The Grafton in Lincoln Square in 2002. After guiding both to become local and tourist favorites, Lawless now operates three restaurants in downtown Chicago: The Gage, Acanto, and The Dawson. Lawless first came to the U.S. on a visa reserved for businessmen promising to make an investment that employs at least 10 people,

but which doesn't allow for becoming a citizen. He now has an estimated 250 employees. However, it wasn't until his son married a U.S. citizen, became a citizen himself and then sponsored mom and dad that Lawless had his own path to citizenship. Lawless and his wife were sworn in as US citizens in August 2014.

His advocacy for immigration reform began when Lawless and his family were running The Irish Oak. It was at that time he learned of the difficulties his own employees and the larger Chicago Irish immigration community faced related to acquiring driver's licenses. In taking up their cause, Lawless saw it was a symptom of a broader immigration crisis in the U.S.

Lawless became a leader in the Illinois Coalition for Immigrant and Refugee Rights, which eventually won passage of a driver's license law for immigrants and more recently has been at the forefront of the Illinois Business Immigration Coalition, which has had success in recruiting business leaders to help convince Republican politicians in particular to support immigration reform.

Lawless and the other 2015 inductees will be honored at an Awards Gala on Saturday, April 25, 2015 at the Irish American Heritage Center at 4626 N. Knox Avenue, Chicago, IL.

A Wilde Ride at Remy Bumppo Theatre

Chicago is in for a theatrical treat this March as Remy Bumppo stages Tom Stoppard's work *Travesties*. Anyone familiar with Stoppard's work will know how complex and entertaining a playwright Stoppard is. The most satisfying aspect of his work is his ability to bring humour and intelligence together in a play that will twist and turn in the most idiosyncratic ways. Nothing is superfluous, every word and action is riddled with clever subtext.

Travesties centers on the meeting of James Joyce, Lenin, and Dadaist poet, Tristan Tzara in Zurich in 1917. The setting of the play, complete with these icons of art and politics, is skillfully woven around Wilde's drama The Importance of Being

Earnest. And, to complicate the story further, Stoppard bases the action of the play on the sketchy recollections of an aging British civil servant who is at odds with Joyce.

Playing the character of James Joyce is Irish actor, James Houton. A native of Dublin Houton came to Chicago in 1995 to study theatre at DePaul and has since become a stalwart in many of Chicago's theatrical venues. It was only when I read his impressive C.V that I realized where I had seen him before. He was Joxer Daly in the musical version of O'Casey's Juno and the Paycock at the Timeline theatre. And, I remember thinking how he perfectly embodied the likeable scallywag with perfect comedic timing.

When I asked him about Stoppard's play he had this to say:

Houton: This was a play, which for some reason, I had never read. My first impression was 'oh this is a funny, whacky play'. Then I thought, 'oh I didn't get a fraction of what is in this play' and started to reread it. There were times I'd find myself saying "Oh Tom, where the heck have you gone!" It has so many layers in it. And like any good piece of literature the more you read, the more ponderings, thoughts, and insights come to mind, and all the time entertaining.

I like how Stoppard (through the uncertain memory of Henry Carr) has drawn Joyce as highly intellectual and yet whimsical. And from my research, so far, Joyce was quite sure of his brilliance, his intellect and destiny and yet described by many friends as fun and fond of whimsy. I am looking forward to experimenting with Stoppard's varying artistic forms in rehearsals, the language and the physicality of the comedy/farce. These stretch your muscles as an actor. I know it will be very challenging and rewarding. And I am sure a few frustrations along the way

What is apparent throughout is Stoppard's playfulness with language and form. Is that Stoppard's art, or is it just homage, or travesty?!! The play centres on art and politics, their usefulness, worth, whether one is more important than the other or can one exist without the other. And importantlywhat is art? What is art and important to Joyce varies widely from Tzara and Lenin. And throughout this play different art forms are introduced-various forms of poetry, imitation, performance art, musicals - is any one of them more important than another... any one more significant? I am really looking forward to the pre-, post- show talkbacks with audience members, not to mention the cast discussions throughout rehearsals.

The play is set in a time of political upheaval, and artistic innovation. Does it have anything to say to a modern audience?

Houton: I feel it is interesting that our theatre and politics stem from the same place - Greece! So from the beginning they have co-existed!

Personally I feel there is something ritualistic and artistic built into our DNA. One only has to look at an infant instinctively smiling, gyrating and making noise to background music! I think art is important for us as humans. I don't say this just because I am an artist, but because throughout history, examples exist where art and the humanities become very significant in people's lives. It seems to add meaning. It becomes significant at a time where it's not necessary, unless you factor in the human element - Booksellers say there is a large increase in the sale of poetry books when a loved one dies (Tzara's poetry was greatly influenced from the senseless killing during WWI). Many Berliners and Londoners flocked to the theatre during WWII when there was a good chance of being bombed. Huge numbers of survivors of 9/11 changed their professions to the arts and humanities.

The themes of this play resonate with Houton's thinking. Citing the origins of the Abbey, and Derry's Field Day theatre, he believes they are examples of how 'art' attempts to 'heal the divide in communities better than politics'. It all echoes the efforts of Yeats, or Friel, to create theatre that is both entertaining and intellectually satisfying.

Bolstered with rich, quality, acting, I look forward to reviewing this bold effort of Remy Bumppo to bring to life a drama that forces us to think of the role of art in a society where art can tug at the political heartstings of the day. Think of recent events in France and you see the danger facing the artist who refuses to be forced into silence.





George Casey Coming to His Comedy Home - Chicago!

By Ryanne Gallagher Johnson he knows exactly what it takes to There are three key endeavors

that create possibilities in life, and for Irish comedian George Casey, those are the three things that he has come to take pride in, and have helped lead him to his success since emigrating to the States in 1970. Given the changing times and types of audiences over the decades, comedy in particular may be a difficult field of entertainment to make it in, especially for as long as George has. But its quite obvious, as evidenced in the breadth of his career and the long road he's taken to reach this point in his life, that

make a name for himself. "Hard work, self-reliance, and

perseverance," he reveals.

For George, in the U.S., it started, humbly, with dishes. And a very generous benefactor who gave him just the right push toward opportunity.

Having spent a summer as a J-1er exchange student when he was 18, George enjoyed the U.S. enough to later attempt to obtain a green card. He first worked as a dishwasher, playing guitar and singing during his free time at The Atlantic on Grand Avenue in

Chicago, under the management of Emyr Morris. "Before I left Ireland, I per-

formed regularly as a singing minstrel at Dromoland Castle. When I began work as a dishwasher at the Atlantic, I had mentioned this fact to Emyr and Lisa (Morris). One busy Saturday night the scheduled performer was a no show, and Emyr had a full house. He ran back to the kitchen and asked me if I could use the equipment on stage and sing a few songs to buy some time, still hoping the scheduled performer was only running a little late. I played all night, winning myself a new position in the restaurant and a sizable pay raise, eventually leading to them sponsoring me for a green card, and longtime friendship with Emyr and Lisa..." George says.

At the time, if you didn't have a sponsor here in the States, it was very difficult to get a green card, but George lucked out at The Atlantic, with Mr. Morris vouching for him and promising to help him with the necessary paperwork and red tape if he'd agree to stay and play on a three-year contract. Morris explained to the immigration office that George was vital to his business, and at the end of the term, he filed the necessary documents, and even paid for George's green card himself.

"At the end of the promised three years, I had offers from establishments around the country, and Emyr was very proud to see me venture out," He adds.

From the start, it became essential that George made his own breaks. People would get him in he was always told that it was up to him to keep himself in jobs. Not allowing a little hard work to deter him, he managed to become a repeat performer at many different places, and made his way over the years. He refers to that time now as "a great learning experience". And a great networking experience too,

At one point, George was put in touch with Frank Sinatra's manager, Eliot Weisman, which Cruises. He's been doing cruises

lead to Mr. Casey venturing out to Las Vegas. Again he was told, "I'll get you in the door, but you've got to work hard to be invited back." He says that the Vegas venues were the most difficult because



he was working with many other comedians, and the work became competitive, as everyone was clamoring for "more minutes" on stage. But once again, it was a great learning experience for George, and he found his way among all the other struggling artists.

Performances in Vegas eventually lead to the cruise circuit, perhaps the biggest break for a comedian. Both lucrative and time-consuming, cruise boat shows are rewarding for those who are prepared to work hard.

"(Cruises are) most difficult," George says, "For those, you're expected to do two 45-minutes sets every few days for 1,000-2,000 people, with new stuff every couple of days."

Having been in comedy for 44 years now, he and his family are now based in Davenport, FL (after many years in Branson, MO), with George still making the rounds and doing tours and cruises. In all the time he's spent in the business, he says some of his favorite shows have been in Branson, as he's met a lot of people he likes there.

Over the years, he's worked with many, many other comedians and people in the entertainment industry. He's built up and incredible fan base, which began with hoards of Chicago devotees.

"Before I left Chicago to work full time in Branson, I had over 10,000 people on my mailing list that followed me around Chicago and Cap Cod for almost 30 years. Among my fans were Ed and Virginia McCaskey who over the years became very close friends, as well as Bill Taylor, who owned and operated the largest K9 security company in the city. In media, Michael Sneed from the Chicago Sun Times, Radio talk show personalities including the late Bob Collins from WGN, and nationwide radio host Jim Bohannon were among those in the audience. The Haggerty family, The Daley family, and the Kennedy family round out esteemed 'first' families who I am proud to have had as fans."

President's Message

Coming out of a deep and painful recession, faced with a building that needed major work including a new roof, having experienced years of financial challenges; in summer of 2011, the Center elected four new board members and a new Executive Committee. The Executive Committee and the Board felt it was time for a change.

"Change is the law of life. And those who look only to the past or present are certain to miss the future." - John F. Kennedy

The primary change needed was to run and manage the Center as a business, to develop a financial and organizational structure to allow for continued mission initiatives and our future.

Change is never easy and is sometimes not seen as necessary by those who do not have all the insight or facts. Change is rarely universally received and can be difficult and painful short term. Change impacts different people and groups in different ways and can result in personal and organizational attacks on the change makers.

But, for the good of the Center as a whole, change was needed and the team that was elected accepted the challenge and pressed onward.

Some of the changes needed were:

- Increased cultural programming needed to be implemented
- · Hours of operation needed to be reviewed
- · Financial accountability by all aspects of the Center's organization needed to be examined
- The Center's environmental sustainability program needed to be implemented
- A new roof needed to be installed
- Risk management needed to be addressed
- · Accounting and compliance issues needed to be reexamined
- The Walk of Names brick project needed to begin
- Fundraising had to be increased
- Membership needed to grow to address second, third and fourth generations, as well as families and young adults
- · The building needed a through cleaning
- New revenue, such as the Gift Shop, and events such as our Bridal Fair were needed to increase revenue
- Expenses needed to get under control
- Partnerships needed to be built
- · Collection procedures from room rentals and those who utilize the Center needed to be examined and
- · Technology needed to be implemented
- · A capital improvement reserve needed to be started
- · A local bank partnership with one who was familiar with the IAHC needed to be found
- · Profitability needed to occur to fund the building needs and the mission initiatives
- · Increased transparency and communication with members needed to be implemented

Volatility Has Returned

The end of 2014 marked the sixth year of the recent economic recovery. The US stock market and bond market posted strong gains for the year. But just as many people were starting to think the stock market only moves in one direction, which has been UP the past few years, volatility reared its ugly head. Volatility is a measure of risk and in terms of the stock market is used to describe price movements, both up and down. This recent volatility has caused many investors to feel anxiety, which is a completely natural emotions, though, can end up

There are a number of theories about why markets have become more volatile. Global growth worries, policy doubt, geopolitical risk, and even the Ebola virus had a play in recent volatility. And while the media headlines proclaim that "investors are dumping stocks," remember someone is buying them. Those people are often the long-term investors.

Timing the market is hard. Recoveries can come just as quickly and just as violently as the prior correction. For instance, in March 2009—when market sentiment was

helps with the gains investors have at its worst—the S&P 500 turned and put in 7 consecutive months of gains totaling almost 80%.

Diversification works. While volatility has returned to the equity markets, highly conservative government bonds have done exceptionally well. Diversification helps limit the damage to a portfolio by spreading the risk out and increasing the areas for potential return.

Nothing lasts forever. Just as loading up on risk when prices are high can leave you exposed to a correction, dumping risk altogether when prices are low means you can miss the turn when it comes. As always in life, moderation is a good policy.

Be Disciplined. Market volatility is scary. But through discipline, diversification, and understanding how markets work, the ride can be made tolerable.



These include the right to make a claim if injured as a result of a fall on ice or snow, and include the responsibility of the owners of land to keep the premises reasonably safe. Municipal Ordinances Re-

quiring The Removal Of Snow Under a City of Chicago Ordi-

nance, there is a requirement for any owner, renter, or any other person responsible for any building in the City to remove the snow and ice from the sidewalk in front of the building.

While these municipal ordito remove snow, they are, generally speaking, for the benefit of the municipality. They usually do not establish a separate duty on the part of the land owner for injuries from falls.

"Natural Accumulation" And The Law Concerning Ice And

While, as a general rule, property owners have a responsibility to maintain their property in a reasonably safe condition, property owners are not responsible for the "natural accumulation"

sibilities as it relates to snow falls. of snow or ice on their property. This also applies if clearing off the snow exposes a natural accumulation of ice beneath the snow. The concept of "natural accumulation" would include ruts or uneven surfaces made by pedestrians and vehicles which result from a thawing and refreezing on a properly maintained surface. As to business property own-

ers, they have no responsibility to remove water or snow tracked in by customers or even to provide a mat or rug to wipe their feet. And, unless it is an unnatural accumulation, there is no duty to remove water accumulated around a rug or mat. **Injuries From Falls On Ice And**

Claims for injuries from falls on snowy and icy walkways or parking lots are often based on an "unnatural accumulation" or negligent maintenance or design of the walkway or parking lot. In the past, there was a recovery because a slopping sidewalk created an unnatural accumulation of ice and snow resulting in a fall. Another recovery for an injury was made because an improper design of a entry way resulted in an unnatural accumulation. Liability has resulted from leaking gutters or downspouts forming ice on a stairway or a sump pump discharge forming ice on a sidewalk. Liability may also result from a negligent removal of ice and snow if it creates an unnatural accumulation. However, to encourage owners to remove ice and snow from sidewalks, the Illinois General Assembly passed the Snow and Ice Removal Act. The Act provides that residential property owners removing ice or snow abutting their property will not be liable for injuries unless their acts are willful and wanton. As can be seen, the facts of each individual case will determine

Generally speaking, to begin to establish a claim, first, the claimant must be able to show there was an unnatural accumulation of snow which presented an unreasonable risk of harm to persons on the property. Secondly, the claimant must show that the owner knew or should have known about the condition and the risk. Thirdly, the claimant must show that the owner would not reasonably expect persons to

be considered a substitute for individual legal advice from an attorney based on the facts of a particular case.

The law has established protections for owners and occupiers of land for claims based on nature accumulations of snow and ice. However, as discussed, there are exceptions to these rules. The hope is that everyone can enjoy the snow and outdoors without any serious injuries. And keep in mind: Spring is only a few months away.

Republican's Take Charge

As I begin to prepare this month's contribution, the GOP is going through the process of taking control of both chambers of Congress. It will be the first time since 2006 that the Republicans will be in charge of both houses. As most naval historians note, Barry can be classed on a par with Jones for nautical skill and daring, but he exceeds him in the length of service (17 years) to his adopted country and his fidelity to the nurturing of a permanent American Navy. Indeed, Barry deserves the proud epithet, "Father of the American Navy," a title bestowed on him not by current generations of admirers, but by his contemporaries, who were in the best position to judge. Barry's war contributions are unparalleled: he was the first to capture a British war vessel on the high seas; he captured two British ships after being severely wounded in a ferocious sea battle; he quelled three mutinies; he fought on land at the Battles of Trenton and Princeton; he captured over 20 ships including an armed British schooner in the lower Delaware; he authored a Signal Book which established a set of signals used for effective communication between ships; and he fought the last naval battle of the American Revolution

believed have have died from a wave of Cholera and were buried in a mass grave alongside the railroad. In 2004 a group of brave archaeologist from Immaculata University started digging the remains and of many of the men and found out evidence of blunt trauma in many of their skulls, it is now believed that these men were murdered in a mass exodus. The memorial that you see there is at the grave of a number of the victims in West Laurel Hill Cemetery.

These men were known as the Molly Maguire's. The mollies have dealt with much trepidation and unruly treatment from the mining labor unions and there was a significant about of tension between the sides. Wages were low, working conditions were atrocious, and deaths and serious injuries numbered in the hundreds each year. They were treated like low class citizens, we paid less that other workers of

english and Protestant decent and were convicted of murder, arson, kidnapping and other crimes by the Pikerton detective agency. On June 21, 1877, six men were hung from the gallows in the prison at Pottsville, and four at Mauch Chunk, Carbon County. These men were hung without a fair and just trial. On this mural you see the leader

of the Mollie Maguire, Jack "Black Jack" Kehoe, The Old Jail which still stand today in Jim Thorpe PA along with the hand print left on a jail cell wall by Alex Campbell. Before his march to the gallows, Alex Campbell stated: "I am innocent, I was nowhere near the scene of the crime." Then he slapped his hand against the wall of his cell, and continued, "There is proof of my words. That mark of mine will never be wiped out. It will remain forever to shame the county for hanging an innocent man." The mysterious handprint Campbell left is still there today, although the wall has been washed, painted over, and, according to some versions, even knocked down and replaced. A forensic scientist who examined the handprint with infrared photography in the 1990s concluded that it had never been

Now as we move to the left of the mural we start to get into the troubles in the north of Ireland. On the lower side of the memorial we start at the Bogside where the famous "Free Derry Mural at the corner of Lecky Road and Fahan Street in the Bogside. The slogan was first painted in January 1969 by John Casey. The boy in the gas mask is probably the most striking of the republican murals, and can be found behind, and just to the right of Free Derry Corner. The image portrays a young boy holding a petrol bomb during the battle of the Bogside in 1969, and is wearing a gas mask to protect himself from the effects of CS gas which was fired at the rioters by the RUC.



ascendancy, Anglo-Irish families, they were Irish that had English ancestors that settled in Ireland and colonized Ireland and now owned most of the land. Many were absentee landlords based in England others lived full-time in Ireland and identified as Irish. Ireland was theoretically an autonomous kingdom with its own parliament in reality it was a client state controlled by England.

The majority of the population was Catholic and they were

excluded from power and land ownership under the Penal Laws. These were Laws imposed to force Irish Catholics to accept the reformed faith. Edmund Burke said the, "Penal laws were a machine of wise and elaborate contrivance as well fitted for oppression, impoverishment, degradation of a people their human nature itself as ever proceeded from the perverted ingenuity of man." That is a great summary for the Penal laws they were horrific and inhumane. Many martyrs came from this period of Irish history. Catholics were barred from any public offices and had to pay fines for not attending Anglican services. Many Catholic churches were converted into Anglican worship services.

Let's continue with a different act that England imposed on Ireland. The Adventures Act it was created by the English parliament, with the long title "An Act for the speedy and effectual reducing of the rebels in His Majesty's Kingdom of Ireland.

The Irish rebellion of 1641 was months earlier, and the Act was designed to pay the army needed to subdue the rebellion by using borrowed money. Repayment would come from confiscating the rebels' lands and selling them. So the landholders had most of the Irish land confiscated. The Cathoand the debasement in them of lic clergy were expelled from the country and were liable to instant execution if found. (God bless these martyrs) Some Catholic families had one

person in the family convert to the protestant faith to hold the land for the rest of the family. (necessity is the mother of invention) By the late 18c many Irish protestants had identified Ireland as their native country and were angered at the neglect and abuse by England. The Patriots led by Henry Grattan was trying for a better trading relationship with England. In particular the end of the Navigation Act, it enforced tariffs on Irish goods in English markets but allowed on tariffs on English goods in Ireland. A leading Irish revolutionary of

this time was Theobald Wolf Tone (hence the Gaelic football teams name, honouring one of our hero's) He was the founding father of The United Irishman. The United Irishmen was a political organization in eighteenth century Ireland that initially sought parliament reform. It's aim was to end British rule over Ireland and for Ireland to be an independent republic. Wolf Tone was captured by English forces he was to be executed on the grounds of treason to the Crown. He attempted suicide to avoid being hanged by his English captures as a convicted traitor. His suicide attempt failed however and he died 8 days later from his wounds.


I have a friend from Co. Wicklow, Aine McGillycuddy, she move here recently from Ireland. She is teaching Irish at Gaelic Park, I took

News Just In! Older Adults are

We all know the stereotype – seniors are crotchety, falling apart, and whether it's about the price of milk or 'those kids today', they are always complaining. In a recent write up, USA Today cited several research studies that show that not only is this stereotype untrue, but

seniors are in fact the happiest of all Americans!

One of the most significant research projects was undertaken by University of Chicago sociologists who, between 1972 and 2004, conducted around 28,000 in-person interviews with people ranging in age from 18 years old to 88 years of age. The results were fascinating. Throughout the 34-year course of the study, the happiness level reported over all seemed to rise and fall in tandem with good and bad economic conditions. However, regardless of the economic climate, older adults always polled as the happiest of all. The study revealed that generally there is a 5% increase in the odds of being happy with each 10 years of age.

The study also showed that disparities in happiness between people of different ethnic backgrounds and financial means tended to even out as people aged. Thirty three percent of those aged 88 reported that they were 'very happy', compared with just 24% of those aged between 18 and their early 20's.

Yang Yang, the author of this study pointed towards the correlation between happiness and being socially active. Similarly, another University of Chicago study again challenged stereotypes of older people as being isolated, suggesting instead that those in their 80's are twice as likely as those in their 50's to participate in a social activities such as socialize with a neighbor, attend a religious service, volunteer, or go to a group

What these two research studies really show us is that we hold great misconceptions about the golden years and what may be in store for us as we age.

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

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The Noble Potato

Childhood memories are both mysterious and revealing. What Kevin Thornton remembers are the potatoes. One of nine children in a Cashel, County Tipperary family, he spent summers at his uncle's house in the village of Dualla, where potatoes were frequently on the menu. When they pulled the potatoes out of the oven, the pale brown tubers would split their jackets like flower-shaped volcanoes and fog up the windows. Thornton's uncle topped them with Kerrygold butter and mint from the garden, producing steampowered explosions of flavor. Now that was a potato.

The potato has long been Ireland's signature foodstuff. But in recent years, in the hands of creative chefs like Thornton, it has undergone a serious makeover. It has become the stuff of art.

Thornton, the first Irish chef to receive two Michelin stars, is one of the country's most prominent culinary heroes. A slim, energetic grandfather, Thornton is also an accomplished photographer. Images of the Irish landscape and his culinary creations decorate the earth-toned walls of his restaurant, Thornton's, which is located in the elegant Fitzwilliam Hotel of St. Stephen's Park in Dublin. Thornton's approach to his menu reflects his ebullient aesthetic sensibility. Every dish is like a chapter in an illustrated story about Ireland: lamb from Bere Island, off the coast of

Cork, is served on a forest of herbs sitting on a slab that looks like, well, an island; cod fritters on a bed of seaweed and rounded pebbles from the shore; and, of course, potatoes in a variety of extraordinary and unexpected forms.

Ireland's affair with the potato dates from the 18th century, when the hearty characteristics of the spud, combined with economic oppression, led the Irish to embrace it as the staple of their diet. In the 19th century, however, excessive dependency on this single crop

explore the potato's place in the story of Irish identity, but also to celebrate its multiplicity of forms. Ireland produces a large number of regional potato varieties, reflecting the country's natural biodiversity. The work of chefs like Thornton,

who demonstrate the wondrous potential of this once-humble ingredient night after night, has no doubt contributed to the potato's renaissance in all quarters. Urban Farm, a Dublin-based nonprofit organization that supports artisanal agriculture, has launched a project



proved disastrous. From 1845-1852, the potato blight ravaged potato crops, leading to mass starvation and emigration. The famine is thought to have caused the population in Ireland to drop by over 25 per cent.

The potato of today hardly bears resemblance to yesteryear's bulwark against famine. Today the spud is embraced by a new generation, eager not only to braids.

Fridays at 8 PM Saturdays at 8 PM his eponymous restaurant one afternoon, our conversation quickly turns to potatoes. He tells me of his plan for a potato soufflé, combing coconut yogurt with eggs to explore variations in that flowery-fragrant potato steam from his childhood. Above all, he is interested in exploring the different properties of the many potato varietals he works with: Ratt, Chinese Truffle, Rooster, Golden Wonder, Queen, Black Bog, Maris Piper. As we chat, sous-chefs bring out one exquisitely composed dish after another.

In the same way that an oil painter takes pigments from a few simple compounds and creates a work that inspires and delights, Kevin Thornton does the same with food. His work is closely connected with nature and its cycles. Each potato varietal has special properties of moisture and flavor that make it optimal for different seasons. In the fall, Thornton alternates slices of potato with truffle for a luxuriously savory treat. In winter, he combines potatoes with salt cod to create a beignet. In spring, he uses sweet potato to craft gnocchi, which is then smoked in hay. Summer is the optimal season for new potatoes; in an homage to his childhood, he dresses them with mint.

Thornton's Restaurant is on the leading edge of potato innovation, but others are giving a strong showing. At Fade Street Social, one of Dublin's best new restaurants, purple potatoes are combined with beetroot mousse and dressed with a dollop of crème fraiche flavored with citrus zest; the effect is fresh and so sweet it could almost work as a dessert. At Pearl Brasserie on Merrion Street Upper, baked potato gnocci is inventively paired with sweet corn, poblano peppers, buffalo mozzarella and basil.

Those who like their tradition with a twist should head to Padraic Og Gallagher's award-winning Boxty House, which serves up variations on the time-honored Irish dish of Boxty – a light potato pancake. Memorable dishes include their Famous Gaelic Boxty, a hearty concoction of Irish beef medallions in a whiskey and

When I visit Kevin Thornton at mushroom cream sauce, wrapped in the traditional Leitrim boxty pancake. The restaurant's motto: "The Humble Spud Made Beauti-

Thornton himself is fond of many traditional Irish potato dishes, but there is one doesn't seem to care for much: French fries, or "chips." While he'll prepare a mean basket of fries for the kids, he expects adults to savor flavors that are more pure and complex. "Putting butter on potatoes is fine for home cooking, but at the restaurant we don't use that much of it," he says. "The potato itself should taste good."

Pomme Maxine ©kevinthornton Makes 6 portions approx

Ingredients 4-6Rooster Potatoes 1 packet of butter, see note 1

Method Core the centre of the potatoes with a potato cutter. The cutter should be 30mm in diameter. Slice the top and bottom of the core with a knife to remove any of the skin. Slice the core with a meat slicer to a thickness of 2mm. Drop slices into warm clarified butter.

Take a 100mm metal tartlet mould and line the mould with the potato slices. Pack them close together, otherwise they will fall apart during cooking, don't forget to season between each layer. When you have 2-3 layers built up you can pour a small bit of the clarified butter over the potatoes.

Cook the moulds over a medium heat until you can see that the potato is golden brown on the bottom. Turn the mould upside down and re-insert the pomme maxime. Cook the other side exactly the same as the first. When the potatoes are golden brown on both sides, take out of the mould and set on a baking tray. Cook in an oven at 180°C for 10-15 minutes to cook fully through. Set aside in a warm place.

Note 1 To make clarified Butter Heat a packet of unsalted butter until the butter has melted. Take off the heat and skim off the top foamy layer and discard. Pour the remaining clear layer into a separate container. This is the clarified butter. Stop pouring just before the solids come to the surface. The solids are white in colour and can be discarded.



Administrative Relief is Here!

November 20th, 2014 President Obama took executive action to amend several aspects of our immigration laws. Among these new policies, there are two deferred action programs that may benefit certain undocumented members of our community.

The first is an expansion of the already existent Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA). things. First, it moves the entry date requirement from June 15, 2007 to January 1, 2010. This means that future applicants need to show that they entered the U.S. prior to January 1, 2010. Second, it removes the age cap. This means that applicants need no longer have been born prior to June 15, 1981, that is 31 years or younger in June 2012. Now so long as an applicant meets all other eligiage in June 2012 or at the time of application does not matter. Finally, it extends approval and work authorization to 3 years. Up until now, DACA was valid only for 2 years.

All other DACA eligibility criteria remain intact. The changes will become effective within 90

days of the announcement, or in As you may already know, on late February 2015. DACA applicants lodging applications prior to that time will not benefit from the above.

The second is the creation of a new program for the parents of U.S. citizen (USC) or lawful permanent resident (LPR) sons and daughters (DAP). In order to be eligible, an applicant on November 20th, 2014 must

DAP approval will be valid for 3 years and potentially entitle approved applicants to a work permit and the ability to travel

with advance permission. The cost will be \$465. DAP applications should be available within 180 days from the announcement, or in late May 2015. Another of the new memo-

randa unifies the enforcement priorities of the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) across all applications. It prioritizes in three tiers the type of criminal and immigration offenses that should receive the most attention when the various agencies that make up DHS (Immigration and Customs Enforcement, Customs

and Border Patrol, and U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services) decide who to apprehend, detain, or remove from the country. Level 1 includes people involved in terrorist activity or

who pose national security risk; caught immediately at the border; convicted of felonies or "aggravated felonies"; or convicted of a gang crime or intentionally participated in an organized criminal gang to further the illegal activity of gang. Level 2 includes those convicted of three or more misdemeanors; convicted of a "significant misdemeanor" (e.g. domestic violence, sexual abuse, burglary, DUI); caught after entering unlawfully and came after January 1, 2014; or who "significantly abused" visa or visa waiver systems. Level 3 pertains to people ordered removed on or after January 1, 2014.

If you fall under any of these categories, it is imperative that you speak with an experienced immigration attorney or accredited representative. Even if you do not, but have had interaction with police or immigration authorities, it is advisable that you seek legal advice prior to applying. Remember: there is nothing to apply for right now! 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
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Burmese Sunset

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Near Chicago, the bench trial of a black policeman charged with reckless homicide in the shooting death of World War II veteran John Wrana just ended, with a ruling expected early February.

Michael Brown, Eric Garner, John Wrana- three civilians who died in confrontations with policebut only the first two gained massive national media attention and sympathy. It's hard not to conclude that's because Wrana was a white victim, the others black.

The hate of Ismaaiyl Brinsley who coolly assassinated two policeman in New York was certainly fanned by five months of continuous press coverage and protests against police, growing in heat and intensity until December 13 when a large group of "activists" marched through the streets of Manhattan chanting "Whadda we want? Dead cops! When do we want it? Now!" Days later two Brooklyn policemen were ambushed and murdered by an angry Brinsley, seeking to avenge the black man, Eric Garner, of whom he had heard so much

for so long.

Following the assassinations, 'movement' leaders bristled at any suggestion they pause their protests. Al Sharpton's powerful political ally, New York City's rookie Mayor Bill de Blasio, requested that protests cease while families of the policemen bury their dead: "Let's comfort these families, let's see them through these funerals," he said, "Then debate can begin again." Sharpton rebuffed him, calling it: "an ill-defined request."

John Wrana, 95, was one of the last of what Tom Brokaw called "The Greatest Generation" who rose amid the Great Depression. A decorated Army Air Corps veteran of the US campaign in Burma, he lived at the Victory Center assisted care facility in Park Forest, IL, a postwar suburb nicknamed "GI town", with road names like 'Victory' and 'Liberty', built to house returning WWII veterans and their families

July 26, 2013. Wrana, likely delusional from a urinary tract infection, wasn't letting anyone lay hands on him when nursing

home staff came to take him to the hospital for treatment. He batted at an ambulance attendant with his walking cane. Elderly Care 101: Every (non-

comatose) attendant at a nursing home or ambulance service should know that Assisted Care means "to help adults live independently in a safe environment". They should also know: "The population most likely to experience urinary tract infections (UTIs) is the elderly... Elderly people with serious urinary tract infection don't exhibit the hallmark sign of fever because their immune system is unable to mount a response to infection... UTIs in the elderly are often mistaken as the early stages of dementia or Alzheimer's... because symptoms include: confusion, or delirium-like state, agitation, hallucinations and other behavioral changes, poor motor skills, dizziness and falling." (National Institutes of Health)

But Victory Home staff opted to call police to force John Wrana into the hospital. When officers arrived, Wrana tried to keep them at bay with things at hand in his room: a shoehorn, then a small knife. The officers called others, and asked a supervisor to bring a riot shield.

John wouldn't come out, so police escalated. Five officers forcibly entered Wrana's room for "a violent extrication". crashed in. The commander, riot shield in left hand and Taser in his right, tried to shock Wrana, but failed.

Taser use 101: for non-comatose officers: "Some individuals may be particularly susceptible to the effects... (For) the elderly, those with heart conditions, asthma or other pulmonary conditions, and people suffering from excited delirium... (a Taser) may cause or contribute to sudden death."

The Taser missed. Taylor then fired a 'bean bag' round at Wrana from a range of 5 to 7 feet.

"Bean bag" round- the term has the same connotation as "rubber" bullet, suggesting a child's toy; a Bozo's Circus prop that kiddies toss at buckets. But the bags are not packed with beans, rather some 40 grams (1.4 oz.) of #9 lead shot. That's equal in weight to about sixteen .22 long rifle slugs per bag! This bagful of lead shot is fired from a standard 12 gauge shotgun at 230 to 300 feet per second (up to 204 miles per hour) impacting one sq. inch of body area.

Additional Beanbag 101 facts for the non-comatose: The manufacturer's instructions warn that tests by the US Army Land Warfare Laboratory found the round has: "a high probability of producing Severe Damage at ranges shorter than 15 feet". (In fact, these rounds can be lethal at thirty feet; or even at fifty feet if a person is struck in the head or heart area).

'Severe Damage' includes serious skin lacerations, massive skull fractures, rupture of the heart and kidney, fragmentation of the liver, and hemorrhages. This ammunition has a high probability of being lethal or producing Severe Damage as defined above at less than 5 yds." The ammo literature also lists areas restricting the use of bean bag rounds, including Chicago, noting "FOID required for all IL Cities."

Craig Taylor stood at less than half that distance (5 to 7 feet) opening fire on the diminutive, ailing 95 year old war vet. Taylor then blasted 4 additional rounds.

Taylor was the only officer on trial. Something appears seriously wrong with Taylor. But something is also seriously wrong with training, discipline and procedure in the Park Forest Police Department and also the Victory Center home. Eckel: "Everybody believes this

was a justified shooting". Taylor: "I felt that I did my job... what my superiors wanted me to do". He showed no emotion speaking of the shooting, nor even a word of regret for blasting Wrana into eternity. Instead Taylor used the press conference to appeal for public sympathy: "My youngest daughter-when I told her, she took it to heart. She asked me - she said: 'Daddy, why are they arresting you for doing your job? Why are they arresting you because you were doing what they told (them) to do? And my answer was: 'I don't know." Inserting his baby daughter into his defense.

By April last year other officers involved were claiming to have been in fear of their lives. They described Wrana's table or steak knife as "a twelve-inch butcher knife" and claimed they "mistook it for a machete" the shoe horn Wrana was holding. It gets better.

Paramedic Chya Hughes claimed the old veteran (apparently seated when they crashed through his door) "jumped out of the chair with the speed of an MMA fighter". Miracles never cease! A 95-year-old veteran shuffling around with a cane and walker, suddenly morphs into a lightning-quick mixed martial artist, striking cold fear into the hearts of five beefy policemen and assorted emergency workers. A pair or two of undershorts soiled by these panic-stricken police and paras would lend their story a little

Prosecutors claimed Wrana died after refusing an operation to stanch internal bleeding. Wrana's family disputes this, saying the vet long had a do-not-resuscitate order in place, and a doctor told them that due to massive wounds inflicted by Taylor, he would likely not survive surgery. A doctor called his step-daughter, Sharon Mangerson, saying Wrana wanted to speak with her. "He just said, 'Thank you for everything you've done for me'" said Mangerson, "'I love you and goodbye.' That was it." Five hours after Taylor shot him, the old vet died.




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The Habits Of A Lifetime

My usual Christmas trip back to Derry was delayed this year until after the holiday. Since my mother's 80th birthday was in January, a time when I'd normally be back in the U.S, I planned to return to Ireland later than usual. In the months leading up to my departure, my sisters and I worked on what sort of party to throw this amazing lady. Coming from a family of 8, she had 8 children of her own, over 30 grandchildren, followed by a smattering of great grandchildren. With such a legacy, we were eager to celebrate with friends and family the matriarch's finest hour, or at least one of them with a big party. When the idea was suggested to mother it was crushingly deflated by the honoured one. The large affair was instead to become a small intimate dinner with family members. An easy compromise you might think, but location became almost as problematic as size had earlier. One place deemed too expensive, the other too cheap, and middle option just right.

With the hard work of negotiations over, I flew into Dublin intent to make this a memorable trip. Arriving in homeland with gigantic expectations of the holiday, I was, within a day or two, reduced to a weakling by a cold in the chest. Most of my time was spent buying over the counter medications, and bed rest. I had, it seemed, caught something that was going around. And, lucky me, I was chosen to be one the sickly elite. I tried to minimize my time around family members, especially my mother since this bug might be the very thing to do her in before her birthday. The few brave individuals who ferried me around in their cars seemed unperturbed by the invisible assailant as though bravery were enough to ward off its effects. A foolhardy decision as time would tell.

On the actual day of the party, my fever had reached a I was determined to be there no matter what happened. Mother was greeted with cards, gifts, and attention. She lapped up the hugs and kisses (none from the infected one), and indulged us with a hearty smile of contentment. She

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was in her element. Throughout the meal others would wish her well, dropping off flowers and gifts. Everyone ate and drank heartily, except me.

From my vantage point, the whole thing felt as though someone kept turning the heat up. Sweating profusely, I was finding it hard to not want to rush out into the winter's night to cool

down. Try as I might to engage in conversation, I was just not myself. Feeling miserable when all around you are partying does not make a dull man happy, so I left. I justified my early departure to my mother from afar (a pointless effort since she's become increasing deaf and my sentiment was echoed by more than one voice as it was carried closer to her) I had to go and get more medication. She nodded, and that was it. Some brave soul again offered to take me home despite the danger. The months of planning had ended in a weak cough of exhaustion.

My guilty, and depressed state was quickly lifted the next day when I found out that having gathered, immediate family, grandchildren, and friends together to continue the party after dinner, mother also went AWOL. Her illness, not detectable thorough the evening, had surfaced at the climax of the night after the blowing out of the candles. And, while everyone drank her health, she got up with my sister and disappeared. Gone, like Bilbo Baggins at the beginning of the Lord of the Rings, without a trace.

It's hard, if not impossible to imagine how a woman who cannot walk without the aid of a three-wheeler walker rushing away into the night without someone catching a glimpse of her. Gone she was, and the party continued, undeterred by the missing guest of honour. There was no search party sent out. No raised eyebrows. It was as if she was never there.

Why, you might wonder would there be such a blatant lack of concern? It's quite simple. Everyone one at that party knew the cause of mother's disappearance. There was nothing suspicious about the escapee. No foul play at work. And, once I had been told of her leaving five letters lit up in my mind like an Irish menorah: BINGO.

Having dispensed of her duty, mother was ready to leave pitch that made it almost impossible for me to attend, but her gift at the gambling altar. Never a slave to convention, this 80-year-old woman was going to her usual place of worship. She had dined, mingled, and entertained with us enough but now it was 'her' time. It was a life long tradition each of us knew well. Mother, a confirmed devotee of the
