

There are times when there is so much to tell, to explain, to write and reveal, prompting envy in the very hearts and souls of you, dear reader. I just returned from a visit to Ireland

which is good enough in itself, except this was no ordinary visit. So hold onto your chair, walker, or skateboard and cruise along as I share my experience at the unforgettable magical posh Ashford Castle in





County Mayo coupled with the added bliss of listening to three cultured Irish men lecture on the history of the Emerald Isle. Maybe you have little interest discovering what your Irish grandparents did, if anything, during the war of Independence? Maybe you don't want to know about IRA executions in County Meath in 1913, or 500 killed in County Cork. Maybe you just want to hear about the splendor of this historic castle that draws the rich and famous into its sumptuous deluxe space, take a walk in the gardens, a boat on the lake or a historic lecture in the Castle's thirty-two seat cinema facility. Really when was the last time you stayed in a hotel where bedroom walls were upholstered in pure silk, the food at every meal netting a 5-Star, the ambience provided a sense of giddiness and as Niall Rochford, the Castle's General Manager commented, "the restoration work had given Ashford probably the best hotel bedrooms in the country." I'll vouch for that! However, to reflect on the holiday investment, room rates have increased

by 20 or 30 percent. Several months ago invites from Ashford were sent to past visitors announcing a three day Irish History Lecture, combining it By Estelle Shanley with a special priced two day

stay. A dear friend sent a two word text asking "any interest," and off we were, an experience well worth the re-mortgaging of both our homes! Within walking distance from the castle grounds lies the village of Cong, where film director John Ford came De Valera's reflective wrestling with every aspect of a political issue and could be standoffish. Dr. McCullagh noted that DeValera and Michael Collins lacked father figures. He also noted that DeValera led a tortured life: his apparently left, his mother met and married a man from Cuba. McCullagh also claimed that twenty-three United States Presidents can claim Irish ancestry.

Another segment of the Irish trip was a visit to Carlingford, a small village on the


to County Mayo to shoot the film The Quiet Man, staring Maureen O'Hara and John Wayne. The village features book stores, a host of beguiling shops, restaurants and pubs, as well as the usual historic graveyard and a church.

Back at Ashford Castle Irish journalist David McCullagh delivered a significant history lesson on the long reign of Irish President Eamen De Valera co-mingling with his relationship with Michael Collins emphasizing the latter's impatience with

Irish Sea in County Louth. Across the water lie the famed Mountains of Mourne which do "sweep down to the sea" as the song warns. As we walked along the pier the wind howled, clouds darkened, not a soul was out prompting our swift walk back to the hotel. Carlingford boasts the distinction of winning Ireland's Tidy Town Contest most years. Once there, sitting in a pub we asked the bartender if more tourists drift into the village in the summer. "They do," says he, "they come by the dozens."

Chicagoan, Orla Godley Crowned World Champion of Irish Dance for the Third Time!

Chicagoan Orla Godley, at 21-years-old, was crowned World Champion of Irish dancing for the third time in her life at this year's 50th World Irish Dancing Championships!

The dancing championships concluded in Belfast, Northern Ireland, following a two-year hiatus due to the Covid-19 pandemic. Godley competed in the Ladies 21 to 23-years-old category, where she competed against and beat more than 120 dancers from around the globe for the first-place world title. She previously won the World Championship title in 2014 and again in 2018.

To compete at the world's most prestigious Irish dancing competition, dancers must first qualify by a achieving a high placement

at their regional Oireachtas or National Championships. Godley qualified for the global competition by winning both the regional and national title.

"Dancing competitively used to terrify



me. The thought of merely getting on stage in front of a host of judges and an audience would bring me to tears so winning a world championship title never seemed like a reality when I was a kid





The Irish "Troubles" were at a murderous fever pitch when John Crawley volunteered for the IRA. Bloody Friday, Bloody Sunday, the bombing of the British Houses of Parliament, and other deadly incidents had recently unfolded or were about to ... Civilian casualties were common as British soldiers, Republican militants (who wanted the UK out of Northern Ireland) and Unionist police and militants (who wanted to remain in the UK), engaged in gun battles and car bombing throughout Northern Ireland. The death toll numbered over 1,000.

The IRA split over how to react, and the new Provisional IRA – the Provos, mostly impassioned young men who were not hesitant to resort to violence.

John details the grueling challenges of his Marine Corps training, then how he put his hard-earned munitions and demolitions skills to use in service of the Provos. It will see him running guns with notorious American mobster — and secret IRA fundraiser Whitey Bulger; running, under cover of night, from safe house to safe house, one step ahead of British troops; being cap-



tured, imprisoned, and being part of a mass escape attempt; fending off a recruitment offer from the CIA; and being one of the masterminds behind a campaign to take out London's electrical system.

Born ine New York to Irish immigrant parents, he moved to Ireland to attend school. Inspired there by the struggle against British rule in the North of Ireland, he returned to America to receive military training in an elite, special forces "Recon" unit of the US Marine Corps. Afterwards,

he returned to Ireland to volunteer for the IRA and conducted many missions, including gun-running from the US, working with Whitey Bulger. Crawley was captured and imprisoned twice, in Ireland and in England, while on major missions, done in both times by informers. He is retired, married, and lives in Co. Monaghan, Ireland. SEA OF TRANQUILITY

"A simulated life is still a life" (Gaspery, a character in the book) By Emily St. John Mandel Knopf: 272 pages, \$25

Emily St. John Mandel is a Canadian writer with a marvelous talent for taking old stories, i.e., pandemics, Ponzi schemes, or time travel, and making them fresh. Sea of Tranquility, Mandel's new novel, demonstrates this. Mandel is often labeled as an author of speculative fiction, science fiction, and auto-fiction. She can combine many plots and have multiple characters, some of them appearing from novel to novel, and yet she ties the threads together.

A single surreal incident is the core event of Sea of Tranquility.

In 1912, an 18-year-old Englishman named Edwin St. John St. Andrew, disillusioned with the British Empire, meets a mysterious stranger and then walks into a Canadian forest. Underneath a giant maple tree, he suddenly feels he is in some vast interior, like a train station or a cathedral. There are notes of violin music. Edwin is terrified by a combination of unearthly sounds. Is he going mad? In 1994, a young woman named Vincent is filming the same tree and sky and hears violin music and unexplained sounds. The same stranger is lurking in the forest.


Is time, itself, unraveling with one event bleeding into other time periods? Are there parallel worlds in everyone's personal story?

At a party, years later, Vincent meets a visitor who reveals her spouse is running a Ponzi scheme and that she and her friends will be ruined in a few months. In another scene, a writer named Olive Llewellynnot unlike Mandel—is warned by the same mysterious visitor to cancel her book tour because something deadly (a pandemic) will soon happen.

The mystery man is a time traveler detective named Gaspery-Jacques Roberts living on the moon in the 25th century in a colony called the Night City. He works for a sinister organization called the Time Institute. Gaspery's assignment is to travel back into the past and discover why separate incidents from different centuries are rupturing and overlapping into each other.

Here is where Mandel gets complex with stories within stories.

Mandel's fictional character, novelist Olive Llewellyn, has an individual named Gaspery in her bestseller Marienbad, which was released in the 23rd century. Marienbad is a dystopian novel she wrote on the brink of an actual pandemic. Ironically, this parallels Mandel herself whose huge hit, Stations Eleven—about a pandemic—was



published before the COVID-19 pandemic occurred. When it did, Mandel resented being called a prophet.

Eventually, Gaspery travels back in time ration area." to visit Edwin, now a disabled veteran from World War I, and explains to him what his 1912 encounter means. Edwin recognizes Gaspery as the weird stranger from his past. If Edwin is suffering from the war, at least the forest vision was not a hallucination caused by mental illness. This action marks Gaspery as an outlaw and eventual fugitive because he has violated a Time Institute rule of never revealing his purpose.

Critics have high praise for Sea of Tranquility. Maureen Corrigan of NPR had this to say: "Sea of Tranquility is a poignant, ingeniously constructed and deeply absorbing novel that surveys big questions about the cruel inevitability of time passing, loss, the nature of what we consider reality and, in the end, what finally matters."

Here is Laird Hunt: "Following a superb stylist like Mandel is like watching an expert lacemaker at work: You see the strands and later the beautiful results, but your eyes simply cannot follow what comes in between. As in her best work, including **Station Eleven**, she is less concerned with endings than with continuity."

Sligo's Up-and-Coming Trad Harpist BRÍDÍN to Make Milwaukee Irish Fest Debut

Up-and-coming trad harpist BRÍDÍN will be making her Milwaukee Irish Fest debut this coming August.

The appearance just might give the County Sligo native a chance to catch up with friends she made down the road in Chicago.

"I was over on my J1 Visa in Chicago twice and loved every minute of it," BRÍDÍN said. "I worked in Stanley's Kitchen and Tap as a waitress and have made lifelong friends through that (nowclosed) place. I brought my flute and dancing shoes over with me and played tunes regularly at The Galway Arms with great friends."

These days, BRÍDÍN balances two careers, working in the family business as a funeral director/embalmer and writing and recording her original contemporary folk music.

"My dad, David McGowan, who actu-

ally lived, worked and studied in Chicago, came back to Sligo with the knowledge and skills that he learned there. One was building a modernized, purpose-built funeral home and prepa-

BRIDIN said if she's having a tough time dealing with a tragic case, she can use her music as an emotional outlet.

"I love getting into the

studio and just writing and playing my music. It helps me a lot," BRÍDÍN said. "I'm also hugely inspired by the nature that surrounds me in County Sligo."

Also serving as inspiration has been a supportive family, where music has been part of the home for generation upon

"My mother encouraged my sister and I to teach ourselves whatever we wanted. With some guidance from her, we learned tunes we picked up at sessions by ear. We would always play at a session once a week in my dad's family pub, McGowan's, in Easkey Co. Sligo, run by my aunt Roseann."

Family also played a role when BRÍDÍN's debut EP, Ocean of Stars, was released in 2021. To draw attention to the work, BRÍDÍN made a promotional video in an unusual setting - an out of commission

commercial Boeing 767 her father hauled up by barge from Shannon Airport to Enniscrone, Co. Sligo.

"It was so cool to launch my EP in the plane's cockpit, because it was also the first official event to take place in the plane. It brought so much encouragement and confidence that this will be a fantastic glamping site, music venue and more," BRÍDÍN said.

Past the repurposed plane, BRÍDÍN said she's been playing gigs, trying out new material. She plans to release a single, Empty Room, on May 26, then slow-release a yet-to-be-titled album over summer, with the full work out in

"I'm so excited to play for an audience again. There's a real sense of magic to it," BRÍDÍN said.

She noted that Ireland was very strict with quarantine and other protocols during the pandemic and even had a ban



for a time on live music after pubs and restaurants were back open.

"This was heartbreaking and has caused a lot of mental health issues from lack of playing, hearing or experiencing music. Music heals when you don't even realize it," BRÍDÍN said.

Of her coming to Milwaukee Irish Fest, BRÍDÍN said she was one of the performers selected to go by Templebar Tradfest.

"America will always be this big shiny place you always want to play in, so I'm really looking forward to performing to new ears and sharing my music, both old

and new," she said. In Milwaukee, BRÍDÍN will perform by herself, with harp vocals and loop and effect pedals.

"My loop pedal allows me to create a full band sound, even with just little old me," she said.

Thoughts For Finding A New Job

If you're looking for a job you're probably aware of the confusing employment situation. A lot of companies closed their doors. Other companies laid off many of their employees. Covid drove numerous companies into bankruptcy. Many people decided to rely on the "free money" that the federal government provided them. But clearly a lot of people are now returning to work of their own free will according to the federal authorities. Here are some thoughts to help you to succeed in your search.

Finding the motivation to launch a job search after being terminated can be extremely difficult. Numerous people will find any excuse to avoid the steps they need to take, probably because they don't really know what to do to find a new job. Maybe they think a job will simply appear if they wait long enough. Stop kidding yourself.



Your old job is gone. It's not likely to come back, even if your company made a mistake in letting you go.

Don't feel sorry for yourself for too long. It's all right to be upset, frustrated, annoyed or disappointed for the first 24 or 48 hours. After that, such feelings will hinder your job search. If you were terminated weeks or months ago, put that behind you. You need to display a positive attitude in your discussions with potential employers. No one wants to hire an angry person, however unfair his or her termination might have been. There is no shame attached to your termination. Remember the loss of your job doesn't mean the loss of your dignity, no matter how poorly you might have been treated by your old employer. I have counseled thousands job seekers over the years. Typically the upbeat person finds a new job sooner than the person who displays his anger about being fired or laid off.


Resist the temptation to become house bound. Unemployment isn't the time to be running family errands or spending hours shopping for some new tool. Your time should be spent focused on your search. Don't allow yourself to get sidetracked doing incidental tasks. I once asked a job seeker why he could not meet with me earlier in the day; he told me that he had decided to drive his child to school.

Set a daily schedule and stick to it. Ideally you should prepare your schedule the

evening before. Now that you're not catching the 7:37 a.m. train or fighting expressway traffic, it may be tempting to stay in bed

sport. The more people you contact the sooner you will find a new job. It can be uncomfortable explaining to people that you are out of work, but unless you meet with networking contacts and potential employers on a regular basis, your search will drag on endlessly. Adopt the attitude that everyone will help you if you present yourself effectively; 50-60% of people will be of some assistance, assume that everyone is going to help. (By the way, if someone blows you off, assume there is some good reason).

Richard Bolles, the author of the giant best seller "What Color is Your Parachute" said long ago that about two thirds of all job hunters spend less than five hours a week, or an hour a day, actively looking for new positions. Many people that I have worked with over the years have disputed that figure. However, after some research many people will now accept that figure. Five hours a week is clearly not enough.

Seek out job support organizations; there are tons of them in Chicagoland. Their membership can be invaluable in making you aware of opportunities that they have learned about in their own searching. They may be willing to advise you of their contacts.

Of course, you need to review your financial situation, sooner rather than later. Accept unemployment compensation-it's yours, you earned it. Apply for it as soon as you can. Do you have

access to IRA funds that you can tap into or other savings? Can you reduce some of your regular monthly expenses?

Review your wardrobe critically. First impressions are important and a worn cuff or scuffed shoes may send the wrong message. It's amazing how many job seekers wear expensive clothes but fail to shine their shoes.

Choose a reasonable date based on an evaluation of your marketable skills and your perception of the job market, then direct your efforts on reaching that goal. Having a target date tends to give your search a sense of direction.

Outline the elements of your ideal job. Be specific and visualize yourself in the new job. If you don't know what you're looking for how will you know when you find it? You should also know the answer to the question-why should they want to hire you? What do you have to offer-can you tell them about three or four of your past achievements?

Ignore the crepe hangers. Decide to ignore gloomy news. Stay positive. Decide to limit programing that is focused on the negative. Listen instead to upbeat motivational topics.

It's inevitable. You will find a challenging, responsible new job. The question is how long will your search take? Demonstrating a positive attitude and making yourself accessible to employers and networking contacts will shorten the time between paychecks.

Finally, Dr. Thomas Murray, who ran the Career Transitions Center in Chicago for several years used to say," Everyone can find a job if they do their homework and persist." I agree. Carpe Diem.





The months of late spring, summer and early fall—when temperatures are comfortably warm and what rain there is tends to be 'soft,'—offer the perfect opportunity to fill your lungs with the fresh Atlantic air and embrace all that the island's Great Outdoors has to offer. There is something for everyone in this playground of adventure and discovery.

Coastal tours

Sometimes the best way to take in wonderful scenery is from the water. Take a tour around Clew Bay in County Mayo, once the domain of the Pirate Queen Grace O'Malley, and now home home to a colony of 400 seals. From the sea, the views of Croagh Patrick, home to thousands of annual pilgrimages in honor of our legendary patron Saint, are unsurpassed. Or take a cruise along the Causeway Coast in County Antrim and explore the Giant's Causeway, Bushmills Bay and get a bird's eye view of Dunluce Castle. A Sea Safari awaits you in Baltimore, County Cork. Boat tours are also to be had around Bantry Bay in Cork, Dingle in County Kerry, Dublin Bay, and many other places. Bring your binoculars and be on the lookout for Atlantic grey seals, frolicking dolphins, basking sharks, and whales, as well as a host of seabirds native to the Irish coastline, including spot puffins, guillemots, and corncrakes.

Watersports

Ireland's coastline offers fantastic opportunities for all kinds of watersports—surfing, paddle boarding, kayaking, and windsurfing, to name just a few. Whether you're a hardened veteran or a complete beginner you can enjoy just about any of these as many places offer lessons tailored for all levels of expertise.

The west coast has become something of a mecca for surfing. Rossnowlagh in County Donegal, Easkey in County Sligo, and Inch in County Kerry draw visitors from all over the world to pit their skills against the roaring Atlantic breakers.

Inland waterways

Ireland's many lakes, rivers and canals are also experiences not to be missed. Canal and river cruises offer a thoroughly relaxing way to enjoy Ireland's great out-









doors. Imagine yourself floating down the River Shannon, sipping a glass of fine wine and devouring with your eyes the riverside ferns and reeds humming with birds and wildlife. Or heading out into the dark on a night kayaking trip on Lough Hyne, County Cork, where bioluminescence lights up the water. Or exploring the maze of bays, narrow channels, and islands around both Upper and Lower Lough Erne in County Fermanagh.

On dry land

For those more inclined towards the Terra Firma a great way to explore the most beautiful parts of the island is on Shanks' Pony. Walking and hiking are two of the most popular pastimes on the island of Ireland, and for good reason. There is a vast array of trails, paths, and routes, for both the novice and the experienced walker. You can enjoy edge-of-the-world views and blasts of salty sea air on cliff-edge paths around Slieve League in County Donegal, the Causeway Coast in Northern Ireland, and Loop Head in County Clare. You can escape into the rich green beauty of undulating valleys such as the Glen of Aherlow in County Tipperary. And you can weave around the remarkable granite outcrops of the Mourne Mountains in County Down.

'Greenways' have become immensely popular across the whole island. Greenways are a network of off-road trails for cyclists and walkers that often follow the course of disused railway lines.

The first was the stunning Great Western Greenway in County Mayo, but since then the concept has grown to take in all parts of the island, with one of the latest being the 80 mile-long Royal Canal Greenway from Maynooth in County Kildare to Cloondara in County Longford. The Waterford Greenway crosses eleven bridges and three impressive Victorian viaducts before arriving at Dungarvan Bay. It features castle ruins, 18th century paper mills, historic viaducts, and welcoming villages. Other highlights include the Boyne Greenway, which begins in Dominic's Park on the south bank of the River Boyne in Drogheda, County Louth, and ends at the Battle of the Boyne Visitor Centre in Oldbridge, County Meath. It's a short one, at only 1.1 miles, but has a lovely section along the Boyne Canal. The Comber Greenway takes in many aspects of Belfast's unique history. It goes off-road close to the old Harland & Wolff shipyard (where the Titanic was built) and runs along an old railway line. A tranquil green corridor through the city eventually reaches open countryside, where you can spot Scrabo Tower in the distance.

Greenways are a truly elemental way to

travel: the countryside comes alive and you can stop to take it in at your own pace.

A leisurely drive around the coast, or through the countryside, will allow you to see many of Ireland's hidden treasures. The island is full of archeological sites, standing stones and tombs for example, many of which date back thousands of years. There are also reminders of more recent history, castles, battle sites and more.

Golfing

No discussion of the Great Outdoors on the island of Ireland would be complete without a nod to the sport of golf. There are over 400 courses on the island, including weekend hacker or single digit handicapper Ireland has the perfect course for you.

Links golf offers a very different type of challenge. Set by the sea, on the narrow strips of land that 'link' beaches, the golfer faces the added hazards of towering sand dunes and unpredictable sea winds. Perhaps the finest example of links golf is Royal Portrush, the scene of Shane Lowry's fabulous victory in the 2019 Open

Championship. Other examples include Royal County Down, Waterville, Portmarnock, Lahinch, Baltray, Tralee, Doonbeg, Ballyliffin, Carne and Portstewart.

Inland there are hundreds of parkland courses that take advantage of the beautiful and lush countryside and scenery.

These courses truly have benefitted from nature's gift. Drumlin's, hillocks formed during the Ice Age, are an integral part of many courses. A seemingly endless variety of mature trees flank fairways and provide ample punishment for those off-center drives. There are water features, meandering streams, rivers and lakes. There are courses built on old country estates and even some in the shadows of medieval castles. The Old Head of Kinsale course is more heathland than either parkland or links but is a bewitching experience perched atop a promontory that stretches out into the Atlantic Ocean.

Spring Brings New Construction Projects

With the changing of the seasons, there has been an abundant growth in new construction. We recently saw the Mayor's office announce three potential candidates for the City's sole casino license, which will bring billions of dollars in construction contracts and years of work for the City of Chicago. More recently, Mayor Lori Lightfoot announced the

construction of a new food production facility on Chicago's south side on Cityowned land that had sat vacant for over 15 years. The facility is expected to create over 250 jobs. Last month, the first of three tower cranes was erected to begin constructing The Obama Presidential Center. Additionally, there are currently over 130 Illinois Department of Transportation road construction projects going on in Cook County alone at the mo-

With all this, there is an abundance of increased activity in planning future construction projects and construction currently underway, not only on our roadways, but with the sight of our growing skyline. Unfortunately, with increased construction projects there is always an increased risk of accidents and injuries.

the usual pattern, a distracted travel, possibly resulting in an accident.

traffic can be dangerous for both drivers near construction sites and for construction workers on the highway. Noteworthy, the Illinois vehicle code requires drivers to yield the right of way to any construction workers engaged in work on the highway.

The construction site itself can also be the cause of motor vehicle accidents. Vehicles entering or leaving the highway from a construction site can be the cause of serious accidents. These vehicles do not use typical entry or exit lanes, and thus can create a problem for other drivers. In one case prosecuted by our office, a semi-truck abruptly stopped in traffic on the tollway in response to a signal by a flagger on a construction site to allow a truck to pull into one of the sites entrances. As a result, a vehicle behind the semi-truck also braked suddenly and was rear-ended

If a construction company is driver may leave his lane of negligent in controlling traffic many employees are returned around its work site and an accident results, the responsibility The increased construction may flow to the construction company.

Workers' compensation claims for construction workers

Construction workers also have a number of remedies if they are injured while working. Primarily, a construction worker who is injured while working has the right to file a claim pursuant to the Illinois Workers' Compensation Act. Under the Act, a worker is entitled to receive 2/3 of his average weekly wage, tax free, while he is unable to work.

A worker will also receive all reasonable and necessary medical care related to his injury, as long as he stays within the chain of physician referral.

Depending on the severity of an employee's injury, they will have other rights under the Act as well. If the employee is unable to return to his former occupation because of an injury, the employer may be required to

hire a professional job counselor to help the employee find suitable work. If the only available work is at a lower rate of pay than the worker was earning before the accident, responsible for paying 2/3 of the difference between the employee's current pay and

his pre-accident pay. Some benefits are limited by the Act. For instance, in most cases the employer will not be responsible for paying any "fringe benefits" for the employee, such as health insurance, union dues or pension benefits. Also, if the employer can accommodate the employee's physical restrictions, the employee must accept modified work from the **By:Neil**

For example, after an injury to work but the doctor tells the employer that the employee can only lift up to a certain weight restriction, such as ten pounds. For construction workers, this will likely mean they will be unable to return to their old job. However, the company may still take the employee back to work in a modified capacity, and give him a job as a watchman or a flagger.

Injured workers' may also have other claims

In addition to workers' compensation claims, an injured construction worker may have other claims. For instance, if a construction worker is struck by a car while working, he will have a workers' compensation claim against his employer as well as a potential lawsuit against the driver who struck him.

A common situation arises on a jobsite with multiple contractors. When an employee of one contractor is injured because of the negligence of another contractor, the employee may be able to file a lawsuit against the other contractor. Often times this occurs when one contractor negligently leaves debris or material out on a jobsite, causing an employee of another contractor to fall and sustain injury.

Conclusion

Although none of us enjoy the employer may be sitting in construction traffic, construction is a way of life and a vital necessity to our economic and infrastructures development. Unfortunately, with construction can come dangerous situations. As can be seen from just this brief description, who is at fault for these accidents, and what an injured person is entitled to as a result of these accidents, is dependent on the factual situation of each case. If you are injured as a result of a construction accident you should contact an attorney as soon as possible to

discuss what benefits may be available to you.

WORKPLACE ATTACKS

Workers compensation involves benefits that are owed to an employee that is hurt while on the job. Initially, most of the injuries that come to mind fall under the context of "workplace accidents" such as slip and falls, machinery accidents, or being struck by an object. However, workers compensation benefits are not limited to "accidents" that occur while on the job. It is important to know that workers compensation benefits are also provided to those that are hurt on the job as a result of intentional, physical acts of another person.

Workplace attacks can happen employee was on the job; in a number of ways. An employee

a customer, patient, co-worker, supervisor, or a third party unrelated to the business. Regardless of who committed the attack, an employee is entitled to workers compensation benefits if the attack occurred while at work. Those benefits include payment of medical expenses for the injury, recovery of compensation for the time missed from work as a result of the injury, and a lump sum payment for permanent disability that resulted.

An attack is covered by workers compensation if the following 3 elements are met:

- 1. The attack occurred while the
- 2. The employee was performing

attack: and

provoked by the employee.

It is important to know that a worker's compensation claim would be denied if the injured employee was the aggressor. A case may also be denied even if the employee was attacked first and then became the second aggressor. The best way to think about this is that it is okay to defend yourself if you are attacked on the job, but it's not okay to run after the attacker, which would make you an aggressor yourself.

What should you do in the event that you are attacked at work?

The first thing that you should do is secure your safety and call the police and security. You should also treat your injuries by going to a hospital or clinic to obtain professional medical care for any injuries you receive.

As soon as you are safe and 3. The attack was not caused or medically stable, you should report the incident and your injuries to your supervisor or manager as soon as possible. As mentioned in previous articles, providing notice to your employer of the injury is mandatory to recover workers' compensation benefits. Notice (oral or in writing) must be done within 45 days of the incident per the terms of The Illinois Workers Compensation Act.

Treatment for your injuries are important to ensure that you obtain the maximum amount of recovery possible.

Last but not least, the next step is to determine what legal options and remedies you have available to you and pursue your claim(s).

It is important to have an experienced workers' compensation attorney, like my colleagues and I, who will better ensure that all

your rights are represented, that you receive every benefit owed to you, and that you are not being taken advantage of.

If you are a victim of a physical attack that occurred while at work, you may be eligible to receive workers' compensation benefits. I Hope everyone had a great Easter. It's one of the Holidays that our whole family celebrates together. In our family everyone usually takes turns hosting a holiday. Whether it is Easter, Memorial Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving, or Christmas, I always do Memorial Day and Christmas. Christmas is a seven to eight course dinner that is different every year. The River Forest Memorial Day Parade goes right past my house so a barbeque on Memorial Day is kind of a no brainer. It becomes an all day party for family and friends. Plenty of beer and food to kick off the unofficial start of summer.

It is also the weekend that Gaelic Park holds their annual Irish Fest. There was a time when we would drag all our goods from the Irish Shop out to Gaelic Park, set up and breakdown every day, and hope it didn't rain. This was also a family event. The Craic was great but it would take a week prior to the fest to get organized, and





a week after to get back to normal.

Back to barbecuing. The most popular items are chicken, burgers, hot dogs, ribs, and sides like, corn on the cob, potato salad, coleslaw, vegetable, and green salads, a variety of dips,

and a whole array of condiments served buffet style with everyone helping them-

I imagine that everyone has their own special recipe for a number of these dishes which is great. These are the things that create memories for us and our families.

I always try to think out of the box and add elements and ingredients to elevate each dish and preparation. Try adding a little orange juice, brown sugar or honey, and chipotle chiles to your favorite BBQ sauce. You can also kick it up a notch with a little of your favorite whiskey. I like Jameson but Jack Daniels is another option. Brining your chicken for 4 hours adds flavor and results in a juicy a breast or thigh.

You can also brine thick cut pork chops. Be sure to pull the thin membrane off the back of ribs before cooking. I prefer the St Louis spare ribs over baby back ribs. Rub your ribs with a splice blend of salt, pepper, granulated garlic, cumin, coriander, brown sugar, smoked paprika, and chili powder. Slow roast or braise, until tender and baste with BBQ sauce to finish the ribs. If you add the sauce too early it will burn because of the high sugar content.

I feel that the choice of bun for a burger is as important as the meat you use. A good brioche or firm bun or roll that will not get soggy is what you should look for. Burgers should be 80/20. 80% meat 20% fat. The leaner cuts tend to be too dry especially when cooked well done. I like to add just salt and pepper to my burgers but you can add any seasoning you prefer. Making a small indentation in

the center of the burger helps keep it flat when cooking. This is where the fun begins. Choose your favorite cheese and toppings. Here are a few examples. Bleu cheese, bacon and caramelized onions, lettuce, mayo.

Pepper jack, guacamole, Pico de Gallo, crispy tortilla strips chipotle mayo. White Cheddar, bacon, avocado, lettuce, tomato,

mayo, crispy onion strings. Mac N' Cheese, American cheese, lettuce, tomato, mayo. The possibilities are endless. Use your imagination

because just about any combination will work. Hot dogs are not just for kids. Use a good bakery style bun. My favorite is a 1/4 pound dog slit, stuffed with



American cheese, wrapped in bacon and grilled. You can make a chunky topping using mustard, salt, relish, tomato, cucumber, celery salt, and sport peppers, all chopped and mixed together.

Grilling fresh corn in its husk is an excellent way to cook this BBQ favorite. Peel and serve with butter, or slather it with mayo, Chile powder, and cotija cheese Ala Mexicana

For potato salad I use 3lbs red potatoes cut into 1 inch pieces, and cooked in the jackets, ½ cup chopped celery, salt, pepper, ½ cup mayo, ¼ cup sour cream, ¼ cup whole grain mustard, 6 chopped green onions, ½ pound chopped bacon, 3 chopped eggs, chopped parsley, paprika, ½ diced red onion, 2 tbls apple cider vinegar. Cook potatoes 8-10 minutes until just tender. Drain and add red onion and vinegar. Cover and cool potatoes to room temperature, add remaining ingredients, chill 4hours.

1 lb. finely shredded cabbage, 1/3 cup each mayo with sour cream, 1 julienne cut red pepper; 2 carrots julienne cut, 4 green onions chopped, 2 tbls chopped cilantro, 1Tbls apple cider vinegar, ½ tsp celery seeds, 1/4 tsp salt, 1/4 tsp cumin, 1/4 tsp cayenne pepper. Combine all ingredients. Place in colander and drain. Refrigerate until ready to serve for a spicy coleslaw.

Water melon is summer staple. Slice it for the kids and cut it into chunks and season with a little salt, Chile powder, lime juice, and crumbled feta cheese for the adults

Primary Season is Here-Don't Forget to Vote!

For many, Spring is a time of new beginnings-an opportunity to spread seeds in one's garden, or perhaps to clean house. But an oft-overlooked part of springtime is the lead-up to the primary elections in June.

Participating in your party's primary election is the best way to make your vision for the future of the party a reality. In these elections, voters pick the candidates they believe have the best shot of winning in the general election against the opposing party's nominee. During presidential election years, primaries are thrust into the spotlight as Democrats and Republicans across the country whittle down the list of candidates until they coalesce behind the person they believe best represents the party's values and who has the best shot of winning a general election. In 2016, Democrats believed that person

was Hillary Clinton, and Republicans believed that person was Donald Trump.

But between presidential elections, many people tend to push government affairs to the back of their minds. Sure, you might see an occasional campaign sign in your neighbor's

lawn, but let's be honest: who has time to keep up with everything going on in the political world? After all, there are so many layers to understanding the latest happenings on the local, state, and federal levels of government.

I definitely understand the impulse to simply ignore politics in the little downtime we get between presidential election cycles. But, lest we forget, midterm elections are equally as important (if not more important!) as presidential elections. This year, Illinois Governor J.B. Pritzker is up for re-election, as is U.S. Senator Tammy Duckworth and the entire U.S. House delegation from Illinois. Longtime Illinois Secretary of State Jesse White is wrapping up his final term in office, and the race to replace him has at times already been contentious. Illinois General Assembly members are now kicking their re-election campaigns into full gear. And, on the local level, county board officials, assessors, and city council seats are all up for grabs.

Remember: the people running for these positions could be in a place 2 or 6 years from now to run for President of the United States. Look at Ronald Reagan, who launched his presidential bid after two terms as governor of California. Freshman U.S. Senator Barack Obama was a little-known figure in the political world until he dazzled Americans on the primary debate stage with his charisma and charm.

Primary elections can also serve another function: to oust incumbent members of the

ple, U.S. Rep. Dan Lipinski. In 2020, after 15 years as a congressman, Lipinski lost a primary election to now-U.S. Rep. Marie Newman. The people of Illinois' 3rd congressional district decided that Rep. Lipinski no longer shared their vision for the community and instead nominated Newman to face the Republican nominee in the 2020 general election. She went on to win that election, and is now a Congresswoman.

Additionally, Illinois has taken great strides to make voting easier for its citizenry. A recent law signed by Gov. Pritzker allows County Clerks to give their voters the option to permanently sign up to receive mail-in ballots for all elections. This means that, after filling out one initial application, voters will receive a mail-in ballot for all future elections until they opt-out. DuPage County has already implemented this system, meaning that voters can apply today and receive mail-in ballots for all future elections they are eligible to vote in.

Voting by mail gives citizens time to research candidates with their ballots in front of them and has the added benefit of providing an avenue for full-time workers to fulfill their civic duty without giving up a cent of their pay.

Given all of the above, I urge all of my readers to vote in the Illinois primary election on June 28th. For those of you who are not registered to vote or don't know if you are, visit www.ova.elections.il.gov. To find out more about early and absentee voting in your area, visit the website of your county clerk. Democrat or Republican, we all have an opportunity to make a difference in our communities this year. So go out and vote!



Swimming Upstream

Lest We Forget: One Night in September, 1982

Tragic it most certainly was. A truly awful incident that left a 31-year-old man, Declan Flynn, bleeding his life away in Dublin's Fairview Park.

However, it must not be construed as murder. When the case came to trial and the five young men who had beaten Mr. Flynn with fists, boots and sticks until the blood came spraying out of him, stood before the Judge, Justice Seán Gannon was at pains to point that out. It was not murder.

"It's important the public should know it could never have been murder, although it was an appalling thing for Declan Flynn and his family", he said. Well, at least he recognized that it was an appalling thing. It's not much, but at least he recognized that; although it didn't stop him from letting all these upstanding young men walk free.

They weren't really that bad, anyway. The local priest and GAA official had both stepped boldly forward to attest to their 'good character'. Shame on them.

Just...shame on them.

But at the end of the day, what harm had they done, really? It was only what they thought was a steamer that these alpha male heroes had beaten to death. It was only a bender. Doesn't matter that they may have gotten that detail wrong. It was only high spirits. And, of course, it was a crime to be a bender or a steamer in 1982, so sure, what harm?

They came from good homes yes, that hoary old chestnut - and there was "no element of correction required", the learned Judge emphasized, adding: "While I must demonstrate the abhorrence of the community by imposing sentences, I don't think it necessary to be served immediately by detention."

Again, the learned Judge got one thing right - the abhorrence of the community, although that was also something he woefully underestimated.

Declan Flynn's killing took place in 1982, forty years ago. I was working in Limerick at the time, in another life. Yet the shock we experienced when those five walked free is as fresh in my mind today as it was then.

'Outrage' is used so prevalent-

ly now that it's a word that has almost lost all meaning; but the outrage then was cold and pure and clear and showed no sign of dissipating in the weeks and months that followed. For these fine men of good families showed absolutely no remorse whatever. Indeed, they had already admitted to at least 20 other beatings being dished out in the previous six weeks. They would go into the park with their girlfriends but if they were 'working' that night, the girls would go home early. Yes, it really is mind-boggling.

When they celebrated on the evening of their release, having gotten away with murder, one of the triumphalist songs they danced to was Freddy Mercury's 'We Are the Champions'. Ironic that they were dancing to the music of a gay man when that was what the beatings were about.

'Queer-bashing' it was known as then. Up there with 'Paki-bashing' [Pakistani or Indian people]. And gays themselves were known as 'queers' or 'steamers' or 'benders'. God knows where such an ugly phrase had originated -London or Glasgow or Manchester, I suppose - but by 1982 it had well and truly arrived in Dublin.

And let's not kid ourselves. We're beyond that, surely. Let's not lie to ourselves. There was a tacit approval among certain sections that there was nothing wrong with a few steamers getting a good hiding to teach them a lesson. Sure, beating one to death might be going a BIT too far but youthful high spirits and all that.

The 5 who were responsible for the death of Mr. Flynn and the beatings of 20 others were known as The Rollers and seem to have seen themselves as some sort of vigilante group out to hurt those who were different. Teach them a lesson, like. And just as their girlfriends knew what they were up to, reading back through the statements, it's obvious at least some of the parents did as well.

How proud you must have been of your offspring, especially the lady - and I use that word advisedly - who told her son to cover his ass when it looked like a murder

charge. Charming.

Judge Gannon again: "Apparently your decision was made with some degree of haste, and there is doubt about your assessment of the situation". Take a moment to get your head around that one, if you would. Because I'm going to be honest with you and say that I can't understand at all what he was saying.

"Assessment of the situation?" Are you joking? Seriously, was this utter clown of a judge ever for real? These hoodlums were not assessing anything. This was not one of your debating society chinwags at Trinity, this was a man being kicked to death.

For the record, these fine young men that Gannon seems to have been so enthralled with were: Anthony Maher (19); Robert Alan Armstrong (18); Patrick Kavanagh (18); Colm Donovan (17) and - horrifyingly - a 14-year-old who was never named for legal reasons.

Armstrong (who along with Maher was in the Air Corps): "A few of us had been gueer-bashing for about six weeks before and battered about twenty steamers. We used to grab them. If they hit back, we gave it to them."

I'm not a learned judge; I never had the education that Judge Gannon had. But that would have been enough for me to determine Armstrong's character.

Nor did this pig stay out of trouble. Several years later he and a thug called Paul Davis waited until the husband of a 7 months pregnant woman was at work. Then they broke into her home and threatened to kick her stomach in if she did not submit to rape.

They fed her children sweets to keep them quiet. It's little details like that which keep me awake

If Gannon had locked Armstrong up when he should have, that horror would have been averted. Armstrong got ten years this time (a miserable amount in my opinion; I'd have gone for castration without anesthetic, but that's just me); but I suppose it's just as well it wasn't Gannon who was in court. He would probably have argued that just as murder wasn't murder because it was only a steamer, this wasn't really rape.

Snapshots from long ago: -

Association of Garda Sergeants following the non-sentencing: "What is the use of sending them back to their parents when parental control has obviously broken down? What sort of control is being exercised in their homes if 14- and 18-year-olds can beat a man to death?"

Banner displayed during demonstration march through the areas where the killers lived: "Parents of gays love their children."

Killer and rapist Robert Alan Armstrong: "There's not much to think about when you've just killed a bloke, except what's going to happen and when they'll come for you."

As I write this on Easter Sunday, 40 years after Declan Flynn was murdered, there are 19 wars going on across the globe, including the new one in Ukraine. There's nothing we can do about that; we are a sick, twisted and warlike species and nothing will ever change that.

But also this week in Ireland one man was beaten and hospitalized in Dublin; and another two were murdered because of their sexuality. And maybe that's something we CAN do something about. Because if you are hurting people because they are having consensual sex, well...that's insanity, isn't it?

Judge Seán Gannon was 65 when he let the killers of Declan Flynn walk out of his courtroom. He always refused to comment on the case. However, he does seem to have gotten tough on crime. Several months after freeing Mr. Flynn's killers and some years before Armstrong would rape a pregnant woman, he came down hard with a straight to jail card for a rather unfortunate and strangely sad person who had stolen a handbag.

He died peacefully in his sleep in 2011, surrounded by children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

Quite a contrast to Declan Flynn, bleeding out on a lonely night in September, 1982.

with Covid 19 restrictions in place, many events were delayed or cancelled, including the 2020 Irish American Hall of Fame Gala. In April the Class of 2020 was recognized, and on the list of very notable inductees is Rachel Carson, a scientist of Irish descent

She was a marine biologist for the US Bureau of Fisheries who, in the 1950's, began writing about conservation and the environmental problems caused by synthetic pesticides. Her deep passion for nature inspired the bestselling book, Silent Spring (1962) which ultimately led to a reversal in national pesticide policy and the banning DDT and other pesticides. Silent Spring is also credited with inspiring the modern environmental movement, and to the creation of the Environmental Protection Agency in 1970.

In 1966, in cooperation with the State of Maine, The Rachel Carson National Wildlife Refuge was established along 50 miles of coastal Maine and includes over 5,300 acres of protected New England forests.

A contemporary Irish woman who has also made significant strides in climate justice is Mary Robinson, the first female President of Ireland and former UN High Commissioner for Human Rights. She is a passionate advocate for gender equality, peaceful human dignity and climate justice.

Mary Robinson is a globally recognized voice on climate change and frequently highlights the need for drastic action from world leaders, among her many accolades and achievements, in 2018 she published Climate Justice -Hope, Resilience, and The Fight For A Sustainable Future. She relays engaging stories of unlikely activists, mostly women, whose communities have experienced firsthand the devastating effects of global warming and have made extraordinary accomplishments. The resounding message throughout the book is that small local actions of the least powerful can grow into a global movement for positive change.

One might compare the global sustainable/green movement to the old tradition of cooperation

in Ireland where farmers turn to For more information and to each other at times of harvest to lighten each other's load, known as a Meitheal (meh-hill]). On this Earth Day let's recognize the importance of a global Meitheal for amplified action on sustainability.

Irish Art Exhibit at Notre Dame's Snite Museum Ends 5-15

The year 1922 marked a turning point for Ireland: the modern Irish state was essentially founded with the signing of the Anglo-Irish Treaty; James Joyce's novel Ulysses was published; and the Irish Race Congress, a conference with an accompanying art exhibition that aimed to redefine Irish identity for an international audience, took place in Paris.

One hundred years later, Who Do We Say We Are? Irish Art 1922-2022 explores the connection between some Irish artists working today and their counterparts presented in the Exposition d'Art Irlandais, the exhibition of Irish art held in Paris in 1922.

Collection by Seán Keating, Jack B. Yeats, and Paul Henry—artists who participated in the 1922 exhibition—are juxtaposed with works by contemporary artists Patrick Graham, Hughie O'Donoghue, and Diana Copperwhite, among others, to explore issues of national identity rooted in the diaspora and landscape. An "In Dialogue" presentation of the Snite Museum's recent

acquisition of Walter Osborne's

painting At the Breakfast Table (1894) rounds out the discussion of home and homecoming. And, expanding into the realm of photography, a selection of Ireland's rural landscapes by Amelia Stein, RHA, engages epic legends and folkloric memories to reveal history and an evolving culture.

The exhibition is accompanied by a fully illustrated catalogue published by the O'Brien Collection with contributions by Billy Shorthall of Trinity College Dublin, Roisin Kennedy of University College Dublin, Aileen Dillane of the University of Limerick, and David Acton of the Snite Museum. New recordings of Irish music inspired by the art Paintings from the O'Brien complement the exhibition. The virtual recreation of the 1922 Exposition d'Art Irlandais that

Larry Kirwan's Bright, Shining, Dancing, Moment - A Review of Paradise Square on Broadway

Paradise Square at Ethel Barrymore Theater, 47th St/ Broadway, NYC, 3-26, 2022 By Bill Nevins

Paradise Square, the big-time Broadway production which has evolved from Larry Kirwan's acclaimed 2012 off-Broadway play *Hard Times*, is a rousing musical extravaganza full of dancing, loving, singing, free-

dom and joy! And fierce defiance of bigotry and repression! Black 47 fans (like myself) who fondly recall the band's blissful 25 years of dancing- rock concerts and Larry Kirwan's roof-raising anthem "Five Points" from the Green Suede Shoes album will feel comfortably back at home in Nelly O'Brien (Joaquina Kalukango)'s Paradise Square pub ensconced in the heart of the early 1860s Five Points lower-Manhattan slum. Indeed, seated in the lux-

urious Barrymore Theater front row, we could scarcely keep ourselves from leaping up and dancing along. And when Kalukango brought the house down with her fierce, show-stopping rendition of "Let It Burn!", the entire audience was on its feet applauding and there was nary a dry eye in the place!

Yes, the Five Points may have been attacked and partially burned-down during the 1863 Draft Riots, but the hard-bitten, good-humored cross-cultural communal spirit that had been birthed there lives on in the joyous imaginative vision of **Paradise Square**, a sort of working-class variation on Camelot—"for one brief shining moment" deep in the darkest hard- times of old New York City and America's Civil War that just might reignite and illuminate our troubled America and world today. This play is a glorious celebration of that shining moment.

The Broadway production is a grandly collaborative achievement. Christina Anderson and Craig Lucas share book-writing Howland wrote most of the play's from enslavement Washington music with additional music Henry (Sidney DuPont, danced by Kirwan inspired by Stephen Foster. The play's lyrics were penned by Nathan Tysen and Masi Asare. Moisés Kaufman directs the play and

Garth Drabinsky is the producer. Bill T. Jones brilliantly choreographs almost-constant dancing



which contrasts and blends Irish leaping step-dance with beautiful West African rhythmic moves. This play's essential emotional impact is conveyed via phenomenal dancing and singing. The cast is very large, and like the gracefully rotating sets, they seem to be in almost perpetual motion. It's a true thrill-ride!

Lead dancer/singer roles include war-widow Nelly O'Brien (Kalukango), her confidant Annie Lewis (Chilina Kennedy, brightly played by understudy Kennedy Caughell at our performance), Irish immigrant and draft-resistor Owen Duigan (smashingly danced

credits with Kirwan, while Jason by A.J. Shiveley), defiant refugee frequented during the 1970s and or escaped from enslavement heroically by Jay McKenzie at our performance). They are supported ably by Matt Bogart as the misled demagogue Lucky Mike Quinlan, John Dossett as the evilly-plotting politician Frederic Tiggens, Nathaniel Stampley as Underground Railroad conduc-

> tor Rev. Lewis, Gabrielle McClinton as the beautiful "Gentle Annie" Angelina Baker and so many more fine actor/dancers.

The character of the rough, rowdy Five Points. drunken piano- man "Milton Moore" (played by Jacob Fishel) is an assumed identity for song writer Stephen Foster, who has a shakey and unintentionally- treacherous standing in the Five Points milieu. Foster's "Camptown Races" and "Gentle Annie" drift into the show in eerily re-heard contexts. Misap-

plied cultural appropriation is a revealing sub-text here as the pathetic voyeur Foster distorts work songs and genuine sufferers' laments into noxious parlor entertainments.

Over a post-performance pint of Guinness at Rosie O'Grady's upscale saloon on 7th Avenue at 52nd Street, Larry Kirwan recalled that he conceived of Nelly O'Brien's powerful, resilient pub-mistress when he recalled the strong women of color who often managed the Manhattan after - hours socializing and dancing clubs Kirwan and his literary and musical pals

early 1980s. "All kinds of people came in there, of whatever skin color or social status, and not all of them were the most sober or tamest sorts, yet no one ever got into fights and the party rolled on, great fun, grand craic. And those strong women in charge kept things peaceful and friendly," reminisced Kirwan, adding that "as I thought about those New York clubs later, I had a very clear vision that such a safe and friendly place might have existed as a pub even in the heart of the

Kirwan's artistic-historical conception of *Paradise Square* stands in sharp contrast to the warring-tribes Five Points scenario presented in Martin Scorcese's film Gangs of New York. The Five Points of **Paradise Square** is a place where folks of divergent origins, skin colors and social status-black, white, Irish, German, African, immigrant, free-born

by Southern planters or British colonialists.

Larry Kirwan, over his many creative decades has always given us clear-eyed political and historical revelations along with liberating musical revelry.

His Broadway hit play is no exception to that tradition. And in this time of uncertainty and war, we need such clarity and glimmers of resurgent hope. One hopes the good people of Ukraine will find their way to a place of peace and camaraderie like that to be found in Kirwan's warm pub-refuge. Do yourself a favor and get tickets for yourself and your loved ones. The craic is mighty at Paradise Square! https://www.paradisesquaremusical.com

Soaking Up the Knowledge Remembering early Schooldays in the West **Waterford Deise**

It all began on one early September morning in 1963 when I said goodbye to my Mother in Tircullen, and headed off to Kilwatermoy School in West Waterford for the very first time. This was the start of a journey of learning, which would culminate twenty years later, when I graduated from UCC in 1983.

I started school that day with Catherine Coughlan from Bally-

hamlet, and we walked there with her older brothers, PatRick and Tony. Catherine and I would walk home together, as we finished earlier, and we were the only ones at that time coming back in the direction of Ballyhamlet and Tircullen. Over the years as we journeyed back and forth, we would meet many people along the road like John Parker, John O'Connor, Jim and Biddy Morrison and Paddy Tierney, who were always interested in how we were getting on and also enthralled us with many wonderful stories.

We entered the school building for the first time, Catherine and I

were separated to different sides of the classroom! This was a bit of a shock for me, as I didn't know anybody else in the unfamiliar room on this particular morning. On that first morning, I sat

beside a blonde haired young boy with a smiling face, and he told me his name was Gerard Peter Geary from Sapperton. I was familiar with Sapperton as my Dad (Charlie Daly) worked in Maxwell's and he would often let me steer the 'David Brown' and 'Nuffield' tractors. From this day onwards, we sat together in Kilwatermoy School, Tallow School and in Lismore CBS. We remained good friends until his untimely passing in June 1989 at the much too young age of 31. It hit me hard at the time, and I still think about him with great warmth when his birthday and anniversary comes around each year.

Mrs Neville, from Youghal, was

the Headmistress, and our first Teacher was Miss Courtney. She was a young teacher and rode a Honda 50. She smelled of oranges in the afternoon when she would lean over us to keep our letters between the two blue lines. I also remember she had an accident on her bike at Power's Cross, and I'm not sure if she returned after that.

Mick Curley turned up at the school one morning to take a few of us to the School Dentist at the Dispensary in Tallow. I got four teeth extracted and I was in severe shock afterwards. It took me the best part of 20 years to visit a dentist again in Cork after the initial trauma. A few weeks later, I fell off the school wall and fractured my wrist, and the sling was just removed in time for my Holy Communion in 1965.

One afternoon, not long after we started, another young pupil (going in a different direction to us) produced a box of matches and set fire to the furze in the wood across from the school. When Catherine and I arrived at school the next morning there was a fairly hefty black spot where the furze used to be. Mrs Neville wasn't too hard on us and the other pupil in question took the brunt of it that day!

On Winter mornings the open fire would be lit in the classroom to keep us warm, and on break times we would make toast in front of it, and wash it down with Fry's cocoa, from the distinctive yellow tin. From time to time, we would get to go across to the wood (or what was left of it at this stage) to collect some kindling and twigs for the next morning.

Fr. Nugent came in to talk to us about the changes to the Mass that had been agreed during Vatican 2, we hadn't a clue what he was saying to us as we were too young to take it in. However, we noticed the change afterwards when the Mass changed from Latin to English, and he didn't have his back to us anymore. We liked Fr. Nugent, who looked kind to our young eyes as he prepared us for our first Confession and Communion.

When we were all coming home at the same time, we would meet

fun on the roller coaster of being young and foolish. Catherine and I disappeared off the face of the earth one Winter afternoon when we were walking home from school. A senior pupil, who was accompanying us home, had the bright idea to keep us inside Kilwatermoy Church, praying and lighting candles for hours on end, until the Church was in complete darkness. Catherine and I were getting a little worried ourselves, not to mention hungry. Our parents must have been extremely worried, especially at a time when there were little or no telephones in our part of the parish.

A search party was organised in the locality and they eventually found us at the bottom of the dark Church. Whenever I go to KIlwatermoy Church now, this memory always comes back to me as I look at the candleholder in the left hand corner. The senior pupil in question may have been well intentioned, if not a little misguided. it could have been worse, nobody died, and everybody was friends again a few days later.

That was over half a century ago, and time seems to be slipping through my fingers like fine sand, and there is nothing I can do to slow it down. Blessings to all those lovely people who were with me all those years ago in Kilwatermoy School as we began the process of filling our brains with the serious business of learning!

At next year's National finals I will probably be roaming the sidelines in more a coaching role rather than mixing it up on the pitch. With the youth movement and the great young talent Naperville Hurling has discovered in the past year that last match for me might be sooner than I want.

The last bit of bad news I turned up relates to the tools or our trade; the hurleyl. The Ash Dieback Disease in Ireland and England is expected to kill 90% of all Irish ash trees. This dreaded disease, caused by a fungus makes the ash tree useless for the production of hurleys. We know that the lifeblood of the hurler is his "ash stick", made to his own specifications including length, weight, shape, etc. When demand starts to exceed supply where are we to turn? The first major casualty of the disease

is Canning Hurleys going out of business. You guessed it, Canning Hurleys shares the same name as the exceptional hurler from County Galway, Joe Canning. It is his family's business who has been making top notch hurleys for 11 years and due to the dreaded disease and insurmountable supply chain problems they will be forced to close their doors.

The demise of ash trees will leave the hurling community with few options. Bamboo has been popping up as an alternative to ash and some county level hurlers seem to like them but as a traditionalist I will find it difficult to get away from ash. Synthetic hurleys are also quite common but that to me is like using an aluminum bat in major league baseball; it's just not right.

Next month we can get back to some normalcy, the weather should be better, training sessions should be in full swing and hurling tournaments will be abundant. Greener pastures await us!



Enter debut author John Armbruster. When John, at the time a rookie social studies teacher, learned of Gene's story, he immediately planned for classroom visits and lessons featuring the local war hero. But one of Gene's daughters warned him, "We don't go there."

Years passed. Gene and John became friends but never talked about the war, even as family, friends, and other veterans urged Gene to share his story. In the end, he



John initially refused. He had a journalism degree but hadn't written professionally in 20 years. He also had his own fight ahead: his wife, Carmen, was battling Stage IV breast cancer. Eventually, author Ben Logan, a mentor to John, convinced him to take on the project before


Gene took his story to the grave. And so, Tailspin began.

I recently spoke to my niece Mary Doyle who lives in Kilkenny and every time I speak with her, I feel close to home. I have written about all the counties, but I would like to review some things about Kilkenny because it's been has a population of roughly a little over 100,000.

in the country. Kilkenny hurling team is known as the Kilkenny cats.

I was born in St. Luke's hospital which is on the Freshford Rd. just outside Kilkenny. I went to St. Joseph's Christian Brother High School, and I played hurling with them. We used to practice at Nowlan Pk. Many is the time that I put a ball on those blue roofs that are just outside the park behind the goal posts. My two favorite players from Kilkenny were Lory (Lorenzo) Meagher a goalkeeper & Sean Clohessy. In the 1947 All Ireland final in Croke Park Kilkenny & Cork were tied at 14 points each with a $\frac{1}{2}$ minute to go when Terry (Thaddeus) Leahy was in a battle around the Cork goal. When out of the far side of the field was Jim Langton of Kilkenny, Langton sent the ball into the Cork square there was Leahy who lost his hurl in the battle, however he managed to put the ball over the bar to win the 1947 All Ireland for Kilkenny.

I played hurling with Muckallee where I attended school. I will never forget those fond memories. Master Tommy Tynan was my teacher. Tynan in his day was the most famous hand ball player in Ireland. They put up a three-walled ball alley in Muckallee in his honor. Also, my teacher attended the funeral of Patrick Pearse's Mother, which was held in Pheonix Park, Dublin. Patrick Pearse was one of the leaders in the 1916 Easter Rising. He was also an Irish teacher, barrister and writer from Dublin.

A few years ago, I visited my son Mike who lives in Dublin. We went to dinner at Chicago pizza in Dublin. Mike asked me if I would/could move back to Ireland. I do have another son in Ireland that lives in Mayo. It's a tough question to answer because for anyone that has lived abroad for

Helter Skelter

"Undue haste, confusion, or disorder" easily describes the pace of current events that bring news of ever-worsening crises arising almost daily. By definition, that's helter skelter, a name that disappointed, desperate and drug- addled lyricist/composer Charles Manson, who once lived with and pitched tunes to The Beach Boys, chose for his vision of an apocalyptic black vs. white race war which he believed it was his destiny to lead with his Death Valley "family", because his role was affirmed by the Beatles in their White Album. But Beatle power was an illusion, and Charlie's bloody race-hoax path to revolution led only back to prison.

Far less murderous was the race hoax dreamed by Jussie Smollett in 2019- white supremacist attackers roaming solidly Democrat downtown Chicago wearing MAGA hatsan idea so ludicrous that local black radio hosts cracked jokes about it even before two black accomplices were identified and questioned, admitting that Smollett hired them to help stage his anti-Trump "hate crime".

But Jussie had more than Beatle lyrics to support his dream. He had powerful political friends like the Obamas, and following his indictment by a grand jury, Cook County's new State's Attorney Kim Foxx surprisingly dropped all charges. It took two years of expensive legal wrangling before Jussie was finally found guilty and handed a rather mild sentence (5 months on 5 counts of disorderly

conduct) in March by Judge James Linn, who admonished the arrogant gay actor: "You're just a charlatan pretending to be a victim of a hate crime".

But reacting to the verdict in a Chicago Sun-Times op-ed, Kim Foxx mocked Smollett's criminal trial as "mob justice" by a politically motivated "kangaroo prosecution." Smollett

spent just six days in custody before being released pending appeal of his conviction that, based on confessions by paid accomplices and clear video evidence of pre-planning, would have been a slam-dunk for most any other defendant.

So, the farce must play on because the leftist standard is "win by any means necessary"; and the left now makes political hay leading with the race card and spewing racial division once exclusive to Nation of Islam leaders. Labeling opponents as "racist' and working-class whites as "deplorables, insurrectionists and white supremacists is currently the norm in Democrat politics. The drums of hate in America today have grown louder than Lambegs in Londonderry. President Biden states confidently: "terrorism from white supremacy is the most lethal threat to the homeland today, not ISIS, not Al Qaeda- white supremacists."

Arguably, a far more successful hoax was orchestrated following events on Monday, May 25, 2020 when a man passed counterfeit currency in a Minneapolis store and when police were called, died of an overdose after he allegedly "hid" evidence of drugs by ingesting them. Or was he murdered?

When George Floyd, a large, muscular man, was helped from his car, he appeared disoriented, sleepy. He slumped to the sidewalk. Police bodycams showed pills scattered in the vehicle. A few minutes later officers walked him across the street and placed him in a squad car. He began to thrash around, complaining of claustrophobia and difficulty breathing. He was let out of the squad car but continued struggling mightily. It took three officers to control him and bring him to ground. Paramedics were called. One officer held the panicky man down using a 'neck restraint' technique detailed in the Minneapolis Police Department's training manual.

A bystander's video clip of the white officer, his knee to the neck of a black man on the ground pleading "I can't breathe", was the perfect icon for an anarchic leftist agenda. It was played for weeks repeatedly across the world's ty screens, often accompanied by fiery editorials citing "white supremacy" and demands to "defund police". Protests began. Police reacted with restraint. The following day (May 26) the four officers involved in Floyd's arrest were fired by Medaria Arradondo, Minneapolis' first black police chief. By Wednesday night, May 27, protests morphed into rioting, looting, burning, and spread to other cities. Thursday night rioters set the Minneapolis Police Department's Third Precinct building ablaze. In that city alone over 1500 businesses were looted and destroyed. Repeated in cities nationwide the riots were the costliest ever in U.S. history, with nearly \$2 billion in losses. 15 people died; several seriously injured.

Derek Chauvin, the officer seen in the video with his knee on Floyd's neck, was arrested Friday, May 29 and charged with third-degree murder and second-degree

manslaughter. But that same day, a preliminary report on Floyd's autopsy done by Minnesota's Hennepin County Chief Medical Examiner Dr. Andrew Baker was released. It "revealed no physical findings that support a diagnosis of traumatic asphyxia or strangulation." Baker was to officially sign that report on Monday, June 1.

As government offices closed and anarchy plagued the streets, attorneys for the accused officers contend that other important events, ones not sensationalized in newscasts, let alone replayed for weeks, transpired over the weekend. Baker allegedly received a phone call Friday from former Washington D.C Medical Examiner Dr. Roger Mitchell who testifies as "an expert on deaths that occur while in the custody of law enforcement". Mitchell allegedly suggested that Baker "should fire his public information officer" for issuing the preliminary autopsy report. He allegedly called Baker again on Sunday, telling him: "neck compression has to be in the diagnosis" and issuing a veiled threat to release an op-ed in Bezos' Washington Post critical of Baker's autopsy findings.

Also on Sunday, Governor Walz made an unusual decision, appointing state Attorney General Keith Ellison over the County attorney in charge of the prosecutions. Walz said he made the decision after talking to the Floyd family. "They wanted the system to work for them." Ellison was the first Muslim elected to Congress and the first African American representative from Minnesota. In 2016 progressives backed senators Sanders and Schumer who wanted Ellison as chairman of the Democratic National Committee. Moderates opposed the nomination, citing Ellison's affiliation with the Nation of Islam and his alleged abuse of a former girlfriend. Ellison quit Congress and ran for Attorney General of Minnesota. He won, supported by Alexander Soros, heir to his father's fortune, who donated nearly half the total funds collected by an Ellison election

The autopsy report that Baker signed Monday afternoon now showed that besides "fentanyl intoxication; recent methamphetamine use" and heart problems, "cardiopulmonary arrest complicating law enforcement subdual, restraint, and neck compression" had been added. Baker admitted that with the amount of fentanyl in Floyd's system: "If he were found dead at home alone and no other apparent causes, this could be acceptable to call an OD... That is a fatal level of fentanyl under normal circumstances... I am not saying this killed him."

Besides taking action on a dream, winning at revolutions appears also to require an actively supportive media and liberal amounts of political cash.

As of writing, Frank James, a man who's long been absorbing and spouting anti-white rhetoric: "O black Jesus, please kill all the whiteys... I really want to kill them because they're white", finally took action, firing off 33 rounds and injuring 29 Anglo, Asian and Hispanic men, women and children in a New York subway already terrorized by an increase in deranged and homeless people in the subways that has commuters huddling in entryways and hugging platform walls lest they be pushed under trains. According to N.Y. Police records, 461 felony assaults were reported on the subway system in 2021, of which 30 involved a person being pushed onto the subway tracks.

Walking With Ghosts

Walking with Ghosts is Gabriel Byrne's recently published memoir of his life and work. It is told episodically, interweaving stories across time, revealing Byrne's personality through encounters he has had throughout his life as well as in his stage and film career. The book is replete with dialogue from those encounters coupled with the reflections of the actor today, now in his seventies.

Byrne's family is central to his narrative. His mother, a quiet strength and encouragement to him, raised six children and dealt with a husband who was fond of tipple (Guinness employees had a good supply at their elbow). Even so, in a deeper dive that is typical of this book, he describes a moment when his mother has had it with the demands of carrying the family-she intimates that she is leaving, before quickly changing her mind. Years later, as a famous actor, her son looks back and sees that she too may have had unrealised ambitions to act. Byrne portrays his father fondly in the book: the Da quips, after his son lands an early acting role, that he did not need to watch it, since he could see him for free any day of the week. Even today, television audiences of a certain vintage recall Byrne's through his role on The Riordans, a television series in the 1970s. From the first, his talent was clear. Byrne manages to capture the interiority of a role and display profound sensitivity in his delivery.

Writing about his time as a teenager in a seminary in England, Byrne relates: "One evening, when I returned to study hall from dinner, I was told to go to the priest's room...The priest opened the door in a red dressing gown". You do not need to have read The Fern's Report, or have seen Spotlight, to anticipate what happens next. Byrne already spoke about this incident on 'Conversations with Eamon Dunphy' on RTÉ Radio on 21 June 2008. Back then, however, he held back, referring to lines that were crossed. In Walking with Ghosts, he recounts what happened in full—to the extent that he can. While he relates the sordid innuendo of the priest who sits Byrne on his couch, at a certain point the whole memory disappears: "Even years later it feels like the night has been concreted over. I've been picking at it with a pin ever since, afraid to use a jack-hammer, afraid of what's buried in there". It is striking, given that the memoir form is an excava-

tion of memories, to encounter a memory that remains so sealed off to the storyteller.

Byrne interpolates that trauma with another sequence, earlier in life. The circumstances are that he is sent to bring food and drink to a group of young men who are working the land. When they have finished eating, they pick on him and the bullying turned sexual. Again, this recalls the film Spotlight, which centres on a group of Boston Globe journalists who broke the story of systemic child abuse and the protection of its perpetrators in Boston. As one outsider character in that film says: "If it takes a village to raise a child, it takes a village to abuse one". The abuse Byrne suffered pervaded the culture from which he came, and this memoir stands as a rebuttal to claims of ignorance about it, a fig leaf for Irish communities that colluded in children's suffering. As a lad, Byrne heard stories from boys in his Walkinstown estate about other boys who had been dispatched to 'industrial schools' in Connemara. He recounts hearing about the explicit acts they were made to perform.

After a spell on the Dublin stage and on RTÉ, Byrne was a jobber actor in London. That experience had a catalytic effect on him, as it did for other actors of his generation—Stephen Rea comes to mind. As with Rea, the opportunities that opened up in London for Byrne were bound up with moral and artistic constraints. Byrne grew weary with offers of roles to play a priest or an IRA man. As he said in an interview


promoting this book: "That's why went to America—because I didn't feel labelled or identified there". It was the right move.


A sequence in this book that will stay with many readers is of Byrne at the Cannes Film Festival wher

he was catapulted to superstar status after The Usual Suspects opened there. He has ar attack of anxiety and exits the festival to stay in a hotel for days. It is a vision of the troubles that beset him, which he attempt ed to drown in alcohol. His drinking led him to a profound personal crisis, to blackouts and waking up in ignominious situations Yet he faced down his alcoholism. A great success of this memoir is how he recounts his confrontations with such demons and the clarity with which he expresses his jour ney. One of his celebrated recent roles was in the HBO series, In Treatment, in which he plays a therapist; Byrne brings elements of the therapist's scrutiny to bear on his owr life in this work.

This is Byrne's first book but there is like ly more to follow. His facility for writing and the fulfilment he evidently took from writing this memoir, suggest so. Byrne's lifelong search for his own voice in acting roles fuses in this book with his journey towards finding his voice as an author. He writes himself as he is rather than as he would wish to be seen. He has the courage to write disjointed sentences, to write episodically, and to portray the ways in which he let people down and behaved dis honourably. The portrait is richer for those struggles and his acceptance of himself.

This book brings the reader, by turns painfully and joyfully but always authen tically, into the mind and heart of one of the very finest actors Ireland has every produced.


